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My Deal

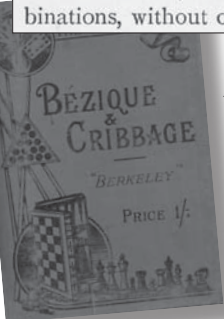


You might not know this, but every time you go to Grass Roots club, every time you enter a tournament, every time you play your neighbor over brats and beer in the backyard, you are playing an inferior version of cribbage!

Here's the proof in black and white:*

SIX-CARD CRIBBAGE.

This game is also played with the whole pack, but both in skill and scientific arrangement it is decidedly inferior to that played with five cards. Still it is a pleasant resource in a dull hour, and abounds with amusing points and combinations, without over-taxing the mind or memory.



Got that? It appears that the British thought that their ignorant cousins across the pond didn't know how *their* game should be played. So when you play six-card cribbage—instead of the five-card version that **Sir John Suckling** invented/stole/cobbled together (pick one)—you're really playing a pale imitation of Suckling's perfect game.

*This jewel comes from *Bézique and Cribbage*, written by someone using the pen-name "Berkeley" and published in London by George Bell & Sons in 1890.

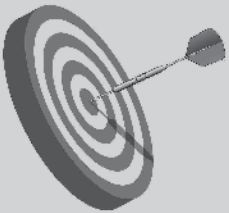
What happened between the seven-teenth and twenty-first centuries? How was this faultless game of five cards corrupted into six cards? When did Sir John's 61 points get inflated to 121 points? And are these two modifications related?

In March, **Jay Fulwider** (Seattle WA), who writes the "Cribbage Board of the Month" column in *Cribbage World*, included a bit of history about the 61-to-121 shift. He reported there an anecdote from a

WWII Navy veteran who had told him that games on ship went too fast, so they started playing twice around the board. At the time, Jay's earliest documentation for a 121-point game was a scoring chart from a deck of Bicycle cards, dated to 1937.

In recent months, Jay, **Jordan Wiklund** (Saint Paul MN), **Boyd McDonald** (Mountain View CA), and I carried on an email discussion of this topic. I was able to push the date back to 1922 with a little pamphlet entitled "How to Play Cribbage." Subtitled "Hoyle up-to-date," these instructions were published by the United States Playing Card Company of Cincinnati OH. The pamphlet does not,

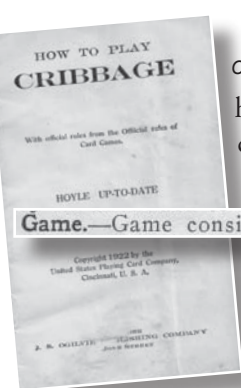
Tournament Tidbits

Greater Spokane Valley Open **Michelle Barthelmess** (Missoula MT), with all of 1,349 MRPs under her belt, was not intimidated in the least—perhaps because she is the daughter of Life Master **Sharon Hejtmanek** (Missoula MT)?—as she rolled through some pretty heavy competition in the consolation playoffs. In successive rounds, she eliminated Life Master (2★) **Roland Hall** (Napa CA), Life Master (3★) **James Langley** (Red Bluff CA), and Life Master (6★) **Duane Toll** (Sutherlin OR)—who have 75,460 MRPs between them, or nearly 60 times more points that Michelle has! To finish off a perfect day, Michelle beat **Carole Herron** (Clancy MT) in the finals.

Nugget Classic Not to be outdone by the female nonagenarians who have been winning Master awards and tournaments in the past couple years, Life Master **Boyd McDonald** (Mountain View CA) claimed the top prize in the 76-player main tourney, to go along with an identical feat at the 86-player Valentine's Day Special in Antioch CA in February. At this rate, look for him to capture first at a tournament sometime in October!

however, castigate the six-card version of cribbage for being substandard.

Game.—Game consists of 61 or 121 points.

At the same time, Jay researched the 121-point cribbage board, and he discovered one manufactured in the 1940s. Named “Saves Argument,” it was patented on June 11, 1940. Each player follows their 30-point street in the direction of the arrow. They



then flip their track to the next street. It is a little cumbersome since the rear peg is now sticking sideways out of the previous track.



Because the history of the game is a little murky, we ended up with more questions than answers. We still don't, for example, know . . .

- when the 61-to-121 shift occurred
- who was responsible for this shift
- why the shift was made
- if the change from five cards to six cards was related to the 61-to-121 shift
- when the first 121-point board was manufactured

If any CW reader can provide printed proof for a 121-point game earlier than 1922, please let CW know. And if anyone knows of a 121-point board that predates

1940, please contact Jay.

What's the Best Cut?

I write with regard to **Phillip Babcock's** letter in the May CW (page 5), about the 6-cut perhaps being more valuable than the 5-cut. Phillip and I are members of the same Grass Roots Club (#89) in Springfield VA. He has over 4,000 GRPs, and over the years I have learned to listen closely to his words of wisdom about cribbage. So, I wanted to proceed cautiously before challenging Phillip's hypothesis.

The emphasis on 5 derives from the fact that you cannot have a zero-point hand with a 5 in it. However, of the 200+ possible zero-point hands, more than 80 of them have a 6. So that overwhelmingly puts 5 in a favorable position. Also, the "glory" hands, that is, 28 and 29, can be achieved only with a 5, reinforcing the perceived power of the 5.

Maybe it is an optical illusion—namely, when a 5 is cut we all anticipate it will help one or both players, and when it doesn't we remark about that. When a 6 is cut we don't think too much about it; if it doesn't work to either player's advantage, we don't give it a second thought. But, when the 6 does give us a good hand, we remember it. A couple of hands that come immediately to mind are A-A-7-8 and 2-2-7-8. While a 5 helps both, a 6 is preferred.

I reviewed 131 big hands that score 16

through 24 points (see table 1). I deliberately excluded any four-card flushes or the right Jack from my calculations. The rationale is pretty obvious, and one example should suffice: a hand containing 5-10-J-Q-K can be 12, 13 (with Nobs), 16 (with a four-card flush), 17 (with a five-card flush), or 18 (with a five-card flush and Nobs) points.

The 5-only (i.e., 5 but no 6) is found in 50 hands; the 6-only (i.e., 6 but no 5) is found in 23 hands; and both 5 and 6 are found in 18 of these 131 hands. Surprisingly, 40 of these 131 hands use neither a 5 nor a 6 in their count. Statistically (see table 2), 5 and/or 6 is thus found in 69.5% of these combinations. A 6-only hand yields a big count less than 18% of the time; a 5-only yields the big count 38% of the time, which is a significant statistical difference. With neither 5 nor 6, you have a 30% chance for a big hand. And of the 18 hands with both a 5 and a 6, there is only one in which cutting a 6 will not improve the count: 5-5-5-5.

As an aside, 7 and/or 8 without 5 and/or 6 is found in 13 of these 131 hands—one reason the "neither" count of 40 in the above paragraph is so high. Thus, there are almost as many big hands with 7 or 8 as there is with 6. **CW**

Cribbage Quiz Answer

Not surprisingly, no one in CW's home office was smart enough to figure out the father's hand, so we asked the creator of the puzzle, **Farokh Ziari** (Fremont CA), for the answer.

The product of the four cards in the father's hand is 72, and there are very few combinations that produce 72 when multiplied. Here are the only seven combinations that produce 72 when multiplied together, along with their sums when added:

cards	when multiplied	when added
A-A-8-9	72	19
A-2-4-9	72	16
A-2-6-6	72	15
A-3-3-8	72	15
A-3-4-6	72	14
2-2-3-6	72	13
2-3-3-4	72	12

Even though we cannot see the board, the son can see the board and the father's position on the board. If the current position of the father's peg on the board was 12, 13, 14, 16, or 19, the son wouldn't need a third clue. It had to be 15 for him to need another hint since there are two different combinations that have this sum. The combination with a sum of 15 made up of the cards A-3-3-8 has two 3s, neither of which can be spades (remember the cut card was a 3 of Spades); therefore he could not have held three spades in his hand in this combination. The only solution left is the combination of A of Spades, 2 of Spades, 6 of Spades, and 6 of Diamonds.

Cribbage, circa 1945

Cribbage was created from an English card game, nobby, in the seventeenth century, making it over four hundred years old. We ACC members play according to ACC tournament rules, which have evolved over the last thirty plus years and continue to evolve with every rulebook update.

I recently came across a book by Albert A. Ostrow entitled *Hands across the Table* (published by McGraw-Hill in 1945). Ostrow does not come to mind as one of the great, all-time ACC cribbage masters. I know *Play Winning Cribbage* by DeLynn Colvert and *Cribbage: A New Concept* by John Chambers, but this title was new to me. While reading Mr. Ostrow's chapter about cribbage, I found out that cribbage in 1945 was apparently different than what we play today.

Here is cribbage à la Ostrow:

- “[Cribbage] is one of the very few major card games in which memory does not play an important role” (page 248). [I can hear the chuckles of a couple thousand ACC players now.]
- “It is customary to have two decks. . . . Each player deals from his own deck” (page 248). [Did Sir John play that way?]
- “If [the starter card] is a jack, dealer pegs 2 points. . . . Some, however, do not permit the dealer to peg for it until later when he shows his hand” (page 250). [I can't remember how many times I've cut a Jack for my opponent to go out.]
- “When a go or 31 has been reached, both players turn the cards played thus far face down (to avoid confusion in further play)” (page 251). [I am glad that we don't have that kind of confusion at ACC events.]
- “His nobs may also be counted as part of a flush (unless players agree beforehand not to permit it).” (page 256). [Does anyone not allow nobs to get a point when it is part of a five-card flush?]
- “In the 121-point game a player would be ‘left in the lurch’ if he failed to reach 91 before his opponent won [the] game” (page 257). [I don't know about Mr. Ostrow but Grand Master Peter Lerch (Hope Mills NC) has skunked me more times that I care to count.]
- “If dealer turns up more than one card in turning for the starter, nondealer may choose which exposed card will be the starter” (page 260). [Mr. Ostrow, please refer to rule 6.2a.]

Reading these cribbage rules makes you wonder how the many cribbage variations around the dinner table evolved. It makes me wonder, as well, how many other variations of cribbage may be out there since Sir John created the game we love so well.

So, the next time you flip your cards over, forget what cards you throw in the crib, or get “lurched,” just tell your opponent you are playing Ostrow cribbage. **CW**

Fifteen minutes later, I was watching the main tournament playoffs when director **Herschel Mack** walked into the room and said that Richard had won the high qualifier trophy board! 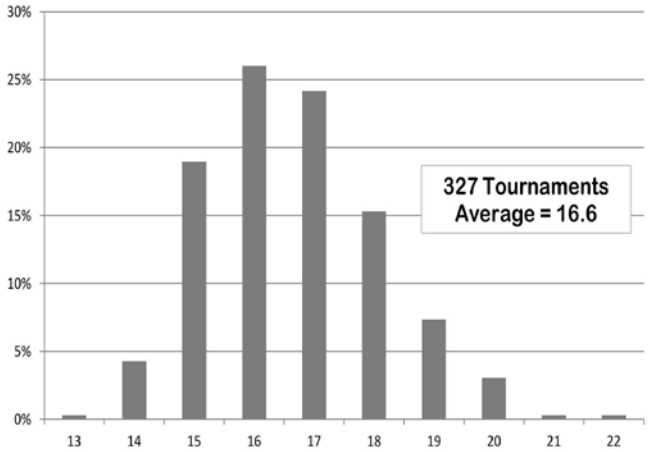

Youth Teaching Tip

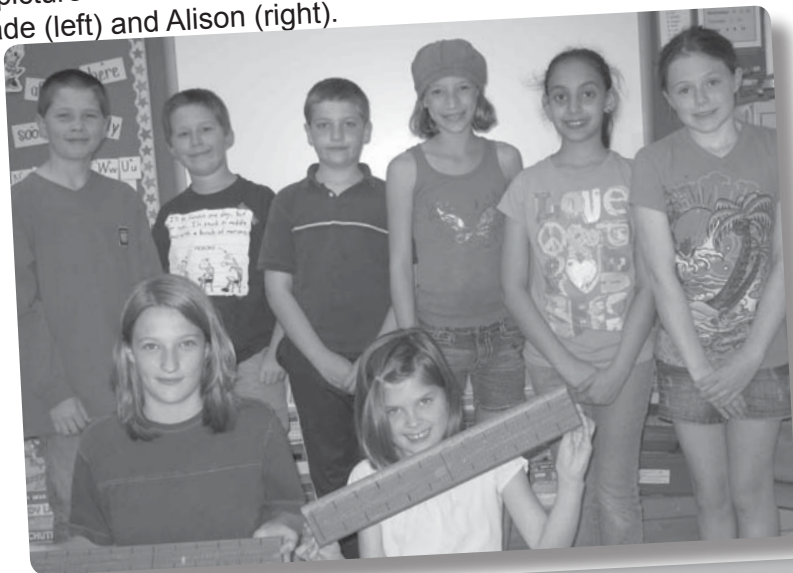
As promised in last month's column, here are the answers to the four-question quiz I suggested you challenge your class with:

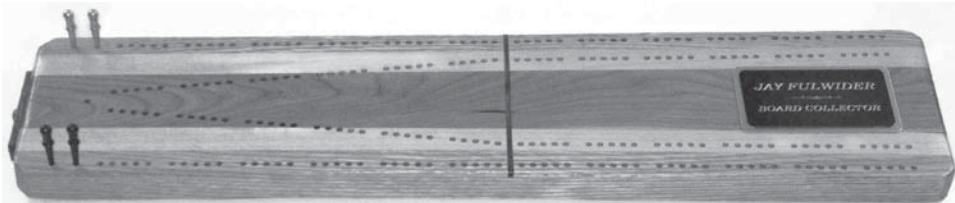

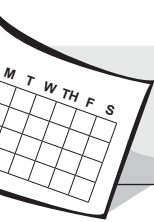
