very fall, between September 1 and December 31, Grass Roots clubs all across the continent hold an eighteen-game tournament that is played locally but ranked regionally.

After a club plays its local Grass Roots Regional Tournament, it mails in all the scorecards to the GRRT secretary of its region, who then checks all the winning cards, ranks them with other winning cards in their region, and makes the payouts based on these rankings.

This season, 1,967 players participated in GRRTs in four regions, and here are the winners of each region:

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My Deal by David Aiken



I occasionally hear from players wondering if paying a bonus for a special hand is good for the game.

Here's the issue: when a monetary prize (whether from a casino or at a Grass Roots club) is awarded for a special hand (e.g., a 28-hand or Raggedy Ann), does this change the progress—and potentially the outcome—of a game? What does it mean if a player goes for the prize instead of trying to win the game?

Here's a specific example: it's the last game of club or a tourney and you can't possibly qualify for points or win money. Both you and the dealer are in hole 118, and you are dealt the makings of a 29-hand. You know that you're not likely to win the game if you hold 5-5-5-J, but—face it—this hand shows up only once in every 216,580 hands! Do you hold for the 29-hand, or do you try to win the game?

Side note: I once watched the late, great Bob McCabe (Milwaukee WI) not hold 5-5-5-X because it was not the wisest hand for his board position. Sure enough the case 5 popped up as the starter card. He did not get his 28-hand certificate, but because he had a deeper understanding of *the* game than most players have, he

won this game.

So, is the awarding of prizes for special hands detrimental to the game since many of us—unlike McCabe—go for the prize instead trying to win the game? In condoning this practice, is the ACC at odds with its own emphasis on a player always trying his or her hardest to win? Should the ACC outlaw this practice?

I say no. First of all, the concept is too entrenched in the game to be rooted out at this point. Second, it gives all of us something to shoot for when we are eliminated from contention.

Third, regardless of the merits or demerits of this concept, it has been a part of ACC history from its early years. For decades now, the ACC has paid \$100 for a 29-hand. And every club that I've played in pays some sort of bonus for special hands. Even if they don't pay for high hand of the night or for a Raggedy Ann, for example, I don't know of any club that doesn't pay for 28- and 29-hands.

So let's keep the game fun. You should always try your best to win every game, but that's not to say you can't go for a special hand now and then CW



The President's Column



We all know that those things we value must be protected. How do you appraise a great day of playing tournament cribbage? I rate it highly, because I enjoy the fellowship of the cribbage community and the competition offered there.

It is usually not easy for tournament directors to find a venue in which to hold a tourney. Hotels, restaurants, casinos, and other places in which we hold our tournaments are usually engaged in business. They cannot stay in business without making a profit. Nonprofit venues such as fraternal lodges and senior centers also need to make money to maintain their sites.

A director must consider many things when looking for a playing area: room size, parking, food availability, handicapped access, and so on. But most of the time cost is the deciding factor. Usually most directors negotiate in order to get the cost lowered or even waived. Hotel room rental nights, meals, gambling, and charity donations are the things used as bargaining chips.

In order for the director to deliver on their side of the bargain, we (the players) must help. How do we do that? By staying at the host hotel, eating at the restaurants, buying drinks at the bar, gambling at the casino, donating to the charity. Now, I am not encouraging drinking and gambling for everyone. But if you partake in those activities, please do so at the host site. And everyone eats and almost everyone stays in a hotel when out of town. It is up to us

to help out or we will lose playing sites! I know it may be cheaper to go to a different motel or go out for fast food, but remember that a few more dollars out of your pocket could make the difference in retaining a tournament.

Please remember that directors sign contracts that have to be honored, and we are the beneficiaries who get a place to play cribbage. By supporting them, we are supporting ourselves!

Peter Worden is on a mission from God. "I'm a missionary of crib," he says. "A 'cribsionary,' if you will."

Canadian by birth, Worden is a fiercely spiritual person. Possibly the only thing that competes with his commitment to his faith is his commitment to cribbage. After several mission trips around North America and the Caribbean to help impoverished communities, he realized he could combine his passions into one allencompassing endeavor. He looked at a map. He decided on Jamaica. A few weeks later, he quit his job as a journalist and packed a bag.

"There's crib the card game—your focus, Jordan—and crib the religion, which is mine. I go to parts of the world most in need of the game to teach it, to make and donate boards, and to spread the philosophy of the game, which is one of togetherness and peace."

Upon arriving in Jamaica, he realized two things. First, hardly any of the locals knew the game, but once they learned it, they loved it. Second, Jamaica is a popular tourist destination for much of North America and Europe. Those North Americans and Europeans come to relax, many armed with their favorite leisure activities—backgammon, cards, and a cribbage board. And who among us isn't on the lookout for a unique destination cribbage board? "They're easy to make, easy to embellish, and fun to have," Worden says.

Many communities of Jamaica and other nearby islands subsist mostly on small sales of trinkets and souvenirs to the year-round visitors looking to soak up the sun. Something as simple and cheap to produce as a cribbage board could slowly help turn some communities (or even the welfare of one family or person) toward a positive direction, encouraging further commerce and trade within the resort-riddled towns—resorts where bartending, serving, and basic kitchen jobs are coveted, the turnaround slow, and the positions almost impossible to attain for anyone without a local connection or a pretty face.

Worden most recently found himself in the northern coastal town of Ocho Rios for a few weeks. "I'm working in the urban ghettos with real-deal missionaries and poor Jamaicans who have been dealt what we might call a shitty hand," he said. With luck, patience, and a few favorable deals, maybe Worden can help turn that around.

Youth Teaching Tip

I have mentioned many times that once kids become proficient cribbage players, exposing them to different ways of playingdoubles, standard three-way, captain, solitaire—will keep their interest. Here's another option: have them play a game where they try to lose. This is a great teaching tool as they practice trying to set up their opponent for runs during pegging. It also keeps them focused on counting their opponent's hands to make sure they are taking all of their points (young players don't often pay close enough attention to a hand other than their own). So far, my experience has been very positive when I get kids playing this way, as they have lots of fun with it.

Youth News

Chicago Park School in northern California hosted an end-of-year six-game tournament for twenty 6th-8th grade students who took cribbage as an elective. Tournament champion was Eric Cunningham (age 12), runner-up was Ivy McLeod (11), third place went to Kahlan McDaniel (12), and Cristina Torres (11) took fourth place honors.

Dianne Needle (Sharon MA) attempted to teach cribbage to her son's second grade class. She reported that a few students caught on, but for many the basic concepts were too difficult, and they soon lost interest. I have known a handful of children under eight years old who understand and enjoy the game of cribbage, but all of them have been taught in a one-on-one situation rather than in a classroom setting. After many years of working with a wide age range of students, I believe the earliest to teach a large group (a dozen or more students) of students is the fifth grade.

Cribbage Board of the Month

Many people ask me which of my cribbage boards is the most valuable. Until the recent rise in the price of silver, it was probably my 18-inch Alaskan ivory walrus tusk board, worth around \$750. However, the higher price of silver probably makes my Meriden Britannia board worth more.



This board is pewter with a quadruple silver plate. Meriden Britannia Co. (Meriden CT) was in business from 1852 until 1898, which makes this

board well over one hundred years old. My guess is that it was made

sometime around the Civil War. It is in excellent shape, so in addition to the silver value, it also is a very rare collectible board. The only similar board I have seen is in Bette Bemis's book *Cribbage Boards*, 1863–1998, which lists five models (nos. 30, 34, 35, 2851, and 2852). My board is model #29, which is likely an earlier model.



My walrus tusk board will probably increase in value because the 1973 U.S. Endangered Species Act prohibits the import of ivory, except for fossil ivory and ivory art pieces made and signed by Native Alaska artists.

My board is a good example of Native-signed Alaska art, and it is legal

to own it because it predated the Endangered Species Act.

On the other hand, ivory art (including cribbage boards) signed "Nuguruk" is not Alaska Native art. Nuguruk was a company in Seattle WA during the

1960s that hired mainly nonnative artists and a few Alaska Native artists to make ivory art designed by the company. Most pieces were elephant ivory and not marine ivory. Even though they are ivory and handmade, they are not considered original art. That lowers the value.

ecently there has been a rash of incidents in which a player has called "go" when the count is 21 or less. Judges have debated whether the renege rule applies. At their last meeting, the BOD discussed whether the rulebook needed to be clarified to cover this situation.

As a Senior Judge, I will never allow this situation to be considered a renege, and neither should you as a player. Why? Well, first of all, rule 1.5.e(2) specifies that "when a player cannot play a card without the cumulative total exceeding 31, that player calls 'go,' and the opponent continues to play all cards possible." And under rule 1.6, we see that a "go" is "called by a player who cannot play a card without exceeding the cumulative count of 31." If your opponent says "go" when the count is 21 or less, you know there are no cards with a value of 11 or higher. Therefore, if you play your cards out,

take a "go," then call for a renege, *you* should be penalized for pegging a "go" that was not warranted.

The ACC's Code of Ethics—something that all players should read and heed (see page 4 of the rulebook)—specifies that "initiating a violation of rules for the purpose of gaining an advantage, whether actually gained or not," is



considered an "unacceptable practice" and is "grounds for suspension or expulsion from the ACC." If you allow your opponent to say "go" when the count is 21 or less and you do not correct it, then you are attempting to use the rules to gain an unfair advantage over your opponent, and you are putting your ACC livelihood at risk.

Since when did we stop using common sense and declare that everything has to be in a rulebook? When a baseball player goes up to bat, he knows he must face the pitcher instead of the catcher. He doesn't need a rule for that. I supposed that if he faced the catcher the pitcher would be able to strike him out a lot easier. But would the pitcher feel like he accomplished anything? Would anyone feel like they had accomplished anything if I said "go" with the count at 19 and you won the game by playing your three 4s in succession and also called for and got a triple renege for my failure to play any of the three cards in my hand? If you answer yes (other than to laugh at me because you would like to see my reaction), then perhaps you need to consider exactly why you are playing this game, because it obviously would not be in the spirit intended by the ACC.

C'mon folks. Cut out the BS and play the game. If someone says "go" and the count is 21 or less, tell them that it cannot be a "go" and allow them to play a card—unless you really want to test our Code of Ethics.

As judges, let's do our part in providing fair and impartial decisions.


