
Grand National 31 Champion

Another Grand National—the thirty-first such tournament sponsored by the ACC—is in the record books, and it was a dandy!

Not to worry: Grand National 31 continued the recent trend of well-run ACC-sponsored tournaments.



The seventh annual Grass Roots Tournament of Champions was held on Friday, September 21, in conjunction with Grand National 31 in Appleton WI. This invitation-only tournament featured fifty Grass Roots club champions from nineteen states and provinces.

At the conclusion of the twelve-game event, William MacMillan (Cheyenne WY)—the 2012 champion at Club 211 in Cheyenne WY—turned in the best scorecard: 21/10 +119. In second place was Life Master Bruce Sattler (Nottingham MD), following closely by Grand Master Howard Terry (Indialantic FL) and Master Troy Thorson (Loveland CO).

Mount Rainier Open Ever have a bad day in the main and split for home without playing the consy? Here's another example of why that's *never* a good idea. Master Tom Cookman (Eureka CA) scored a miserable 19/9 –44 in the main, but then did better than that in the consolation, with a grand slam 19/9 +143! This high qualifying score earned him a trophy board, propelled him to the top of the Western Region leader board, and leaves him only a few points short of Grand Master. Congratulations to Tom for hanging in there!

Len Wahlig Memorial Life Master (2★)

Don Flesch (Brookfield WI) got a 28hand—in his crib!

Labor Day Special Master Jim Jackson (Bandon OR) got a 28-hand—in his crib—during doubles!

Montana Capital Classic The 25th annual tournament held in Helena MT has had three two-time winners of the main: Life Master (6★) DeLynn Colvert (Missoula MT) won in 1989 and 1991; Master Lorne Tanton (Edmonton AB) won in 2002 and 2011; and local club member Walter Conell Jr. (Butte MT) captured his second win this year, after also winning the main in 2000. But there has been only one three-time champion: George Rodriguez (Billings MT), who won the tournament in 1999. Early in 2009, after George was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and warned he had only a short time to live, he returned to Helena to win his second main—and then surprised everybody when he did it again in 2010! This year,

his widow, Vicky Rodriguez, attended the tourney, and a player suggested we retire the 25-year-old trophy with the names of all winners and present it to Vicki. An anonymous donor has promised to replace the trophy in 2013.



Moonshine Madness When Ray Warner moved to Arkansas from Wisconsin, he thought he would never play in another ACC-sanctioned tournament—until he read about the Moonshine Madness tournament in Hot Springs Village AR. And a good thing he did, as he won the consolation for his first tournament win!

31 Away Life Master (3★) Jim Langley (Red Bluff CA) apparently enjoys playing in consolations on either side of Grand National. Last year in Reno, he took first place in both the Silver Dollar Open and the Gold Rush Open consolations, held before and after GN 30. This year, with only one wraparound tourney to play in, he double dipped by being high qualifier and winning the 31 Away consolation!

During his playoff run, Chuck won 19 games and lost only 7, which combined with his 16-6 qualifying round gave him a batting average of 72.9% (35-13) during his fifteen hours of cribbage on Saturday and Sunday—a decided improvement over his Thursday and Friday performances!

Chuck is no stranger to the big stage. In 2003–2004 (his first full year in the ACC) he was the Grass Roots national champion and set a seasonal record of 380 GRPs. And in 2010 he won the 2010 Grand National consolation in Virginia Beach. As near as CW's highly paid research assistant can tell, Chuck is the first Grass Roots national champion to have also won the Grand National main.

Frank Pacocha (Amherst WI) was high qualifier in the main tourney with an amazing 41/18 +197 scorecard, but he managed to get to only the third round before his cards petered out.

Meanwhile, over in the 252-player consolation, Life Master (★) David Campbell (Parsonsfield ME) was pegging his way to a near grand slam 18/8 +179, with his only loss coming by two points at the hands of Mary Burlington (Amherst MA). Alas, after earning the only bye in the 63-player field, David lost in the second round to Master Sandra Stroup (Elgin IL), who went all the way to the semifinals.



It was the #37 qualifier, Nolan Johnson (Madison WI), who outlasted the playoff field. Nolan is a member of Grass Roots Club #1 in Madison Wisconsin, but through one of those it's-a-

small-world quirks, Nolan's son Ken is a

member of Palm Beach County Club 241 in Lake Worth FL, where Chuck Barnes plays during the winter months.

A 35-year member of the armed services (he retired as a Lt. Colonel in



the U.S. Army), Nolan is a throwback to the ACC's early days, having played cribbage with ACC founder **Joseph Wergin** and having been mentored by **Jerry Dickinson**, the first Grass Roots commissioner. Nolan joined the ACC in the mid-1980s and was secretary/treasurer of Madison Club #1 for fifteen years. The GN 31 consolation is his first tournament win!

There are two take-away lessons from this year's Grand National. First, never give up looking for your first tournament win; Nolan got his at age 83! Second, stop and smell the roses—or at least view the colors; from his summer home in mid-Michigan, Chuck and his traveling companion, Joe Daesch, enjoyed a leisurely, ten-hour drive across Mackinaw Bridge and through Michigan's Upper Peninsula, enjoying a mini-tour of beautiful colors along the northern shore of Lake Michigan. We all should be so lucky!

GN 31 Tidbits

Charity Huge donations were made to charities from GN 31 entry fees: \$600 was donated to four different organizations: American Cancer Society, Alzheimer's Foundation, National MS Society, and American Heart Association—for a total of \$2,400.

Accolades Most moving moment—a standing ovation given to Life Master (3*) Bob Julian (Franklin WI) on Sunday morning when he addressed the crowd and, among other things, announced that he was playing his last tournament because of deteriorating health.

Bad Timing! Since this was the 31st annual Grand National, \$100 was paid to the first ten players to score 31-for-8 during pegging. One by one, the C-notes were claimed all over the room. Master **Jan Viands** (Reston VA) was unlucky enough to come out on the losing end of *two* of these 31-for-8s, but then she got one of her own! Unfortunately, the two pegging flashes she saw across the board from her were the ninth and tenth of these hands—and Jan's 31-for-8 was #11. Sigh.

Charlie Life Master Charlie Finley (Enfield CT) was unable to attend GN 31 and defend his championship. On the way to Appleton, he was taken off the plane in Chicago with a medical emergency. While not yet fully back to normal, Charlie is now home in Connecticut and on the mend. He wants to thank friends and fellow players who contacted him with their concern about his health; he writes: "I was overwhelmed and want to say thank you for all the calls, cards, and prayers; they helped me get through a very tough week. I will never forget your kind words. See you all in Reno in February."

Patrick is co-owner of Barrett's Auction Center-the business that his parents started in 1969.



a pair—for a total of eight points"), but automatically tally them as eight points. Even when a hand contains 15-2 combos or a flush, it's usually fairly easy to look at most of them and announce the total value.

But sometimes even experienced players occasionally stumble over hands that have complicated 15-2 combos. This seems to happen most frequently with the 3-6-9

Detailed information is not necessary at that time—a general plan is sufficient. The bid for GN 35 will be awarded at the BOD meeting on Sept. 21, 2012.

HALL OF FAME NOMINATIONS

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/ or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

- Nominations must be submitted in writing (maximum one side of a letter-size page) to the address below. Nominations may be made only by a current ACC member, and the nomination page must include the name of the person doing the nominating.
- 2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing of the ACC for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with standards of good sportsmanship.
- 3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - b. established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated a Bronze Award recipient or higher in the Grass Roots program.

- d. served as a tournament director of an ACC sanctioned tournament for a minimum of five years.
- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
- f. served as a member of the board of directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
- 4. Exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the BOD.

The call for HOF nominations appears annually in the November *Cribbage World*. Nominations must be submitted in writing and postmarked by

December 10.

The HOF chairperson will review all letters of nomination for compliance with



the nominating criteria and mail copies of each letter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The voting panel will review the nominations and return their ballots to the HOF chairperson. The ballots will be counted in Reno prior to the February BOD meeting.

Nominees must receive 75% or more positive votes to be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at the Grand National tournament.



used by Rushmore construction workers for recreation on days when the weather was poor. Gutzon Borglum kept supplies such as this in the Sculptor's Studio, where workers would gather to wait for the weather to improve." Roland gives these instructions for finding the cribbage board:



Walk to the best view of Mount Rushmore. Turn left and take the elevator down two levels. This level has a theater showing a movie about Mount Rushmore and an exhibit hall. The cribbage board is located in the section dedicated to the workers.

Cell Phones

Cell phones have been around for a long time. Everyone seems to have different ideas of when and how to use them. As a cell phone user, how can you avoid being thought of as offensive while at a cribbage tournament? Try following these simple etiquette guidelines to continue taking pleasure in the convenience of cell phones:



- Keep your phone on silent or vibrate if you must carry it with you.
- Let incoming calls roll over to voice mail when it's inappropriate to take a call.
- If you must make a call, wait until your current game is over and then excuse yourself.
 Make sure to move away from the active play area to an area that will be less disruptive; keep the call brief.
- The rule of thumb when talking on a cell phone is to maintain at least a ten-foot zone from anyone while talking.
- If you must send a text message while playing in a tournament, please do so during a lull in play or wait until the game you are currently playing is over and step away from the table. Again, keep it brief.

We all understand that cell phones can be very useful in an emergency or if you are on-call for work. Please be considerate of those around you when you must use your

Economics does not

seem to be much of a factor, as the numbers have remained fairly consistent in both good and bad times. The percentage of reported deaths is so small that it is not a factor.

While only a small percent of members say why they are dropping, the majority of these comments revolve around poor sportsmanship and players who must win at any cost. It is apparent that a few players are creating a negative atmosphere for players. This applies to both ACC tournaments and Grass Roots clubs.

The vast majority of ACC members just want to play cribbage with their cribbage family in a pleasant and friendly atmosphere (winning is nice, but not necessary). In my opinion, instead of the BOD spending 90%–95% of its time on items that affect only the top 3% of the membership, why not do something earth-shattering like spending that amount of time trying to improve the friendliness of the game and to fix problems that are causing player complaints.

The total number of members who dropped after their first year since the start of the 1988 season is 12,372. If we could have retained just 25% of those members, our membership would now be nearly 10,000—and nearly 13,000 if we could have retained 25% of all those who dropped.

After review and analysis, the committee, which was appointed by the Board of Directors, was to prepare a written report containing recommendations, as appropriate, and present the report to the board at its September meeting in Appleton WI.

A written report was submitted to the board at Appleton. Working from the primary premise that *no single All America or All Star selection criterion was going to meet with everyone's approval*, the committee made the following two recommendations:

- 1. The annual All America Team of the American Cribbage Congress shall consist of the top ten MRP generating players nationally plus, if not otherwise represented, the top MRP point generator of any and all regions not represented.
- 2. The annual All Star Teams shall consist of the top ten MRP generating players from the previous year for four regions, East, Central, Northwest, and Southwest where Southwest is defined as players from Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, New Mexico, Nevada, and Utah while the Northwest is defined as players from Alaska,

Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington, Wyoming, and the Canadian provinces of Alberta, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, and Yukon. The All Star match shall consist of 15 games per player with the match scheduled to begin at 6:00 p.m. on the Thursday before the annual Tournament of Champions each February in Reno.

After reviewing the report and considering arguments for and against the two recommendations, the board voted to accept the All America team recommendation and to oppose the All Star team recommendation. This means that there could, potentially, be a maximum of twelve All Stars in any given year (for the cribbage year ended July 31, 2012, there would have been eleven All Americans), while the All Star team criteria, selection, and match play will remain essentially the same as it has been for the past few years. Also, the committee suggested that the two items be reviewed again after two years to ascertain whether there is a need to make further or different recommendations or whether the selection criteria, as currently constituted, is acceptable.

The President's Column



One of the main topics of the Board of Directors meeting in Appleton WI was membership building. In the past, the BOD has invested ACC funds in business cards, bumper stickers, and pamphlets-all of which are still good ways to promote our organization. And we are looking at some new ideas. We are working to obtain cribbage boards that have ACC logo, our 888 phone number, and our website address and distribute them at no cost to a variety of different outlets. Also in the works is a "cribbage ambassador" program, which would be designed to welcome and help new members when they come to Grass Roots clubs and tournaments.

So while we are working to acquire new memberships, we must also address one of our biggest problems—membership retention. Membership Secretary Larry Hassett provided the following information: "Over the ten-year period from 2001 to 2010, 49% of the people who joined did not renew their memberships after their first year. During this time period 10,174 new players joined the ACC, which averages 1,017 new memberships per year. A total of 4,943 did not renew."

Dropping membership numbers is not unique to the ACC. Many social, recreational, and fraternal organizations are experiencing the same thing. The economy certainly is a factor, as are travel costs. But I still feel that ACC membership is a real bargain at \$15 per year (\$18 for joint membership). I have done some

research on the internet about this problem and found several suggestions, most of which we are working on, such as recruiting. But the best one I have found is *improving the quality of the experience*. Every member of this organization has the power to do this by showing good sportsmanship. We should strive to make everyone who attends an ACC event welcome. Tournament directors should rise to this challenge, creating other ways to enhance player experiences. Many tournament directors are doing this by bringing treats, having drawings for prizes, giving out prizes for special hands, and so on.

The ACC has a great Public Relations and Marketing Committee, chaired by Norm Nikodym. His committee is working to get our organization known to the general public. And at the BOD meeting, I asked each board member to bring an idea to the next meeting (February in Reno) on how to build and/or retain membership.

I am sure that you all want the ACC to grow and be available for all of us in the future.



Barri's board is made of cherry wood with red, green, and blue leather inlays for the tracks. There are built-in counters for game wins and a flip-open peg and card storage. Travelers Club versus Home Club by Joan Rein

With the new season under way, the topic of the Travelers Club is a timely one.

Many have asked whether they should join the Travelers Club or stay at their home club. It depends on how much traveling you wish to do and whether being club champion is important to you. Or perhaps you want to be able to earn points no matter where you play.

The Travelers Club was designed for those who travel in their occupation or are snowbirds, traveling to warmer areas during the colder months and then returning home before the end of the season. Because you can transfer between clubs only once during the year, this prevents players from transferring back at the end of the season after returning to their home club. As a visitor you will not earn points. Likewise you will not be able to transfer out of the Travelers

Club midyear, which is allowed only at the beginning of the season before your first event.

If you join the Travelers Club you will be competing with other members of this club for club champion. Last year there were over seventy members in the Travelers Club. You earn points at any Grass Roots club you play, if you have 12 or more points—but only in the first 36 events (excluding GRRT and GRNT). Thereafter you will be treated as a visitor with regard to points earned.

So the choice is yours: earn points in the first 36 Grass Roots tourneys of your choice—or compete for the club championship at your home club.
