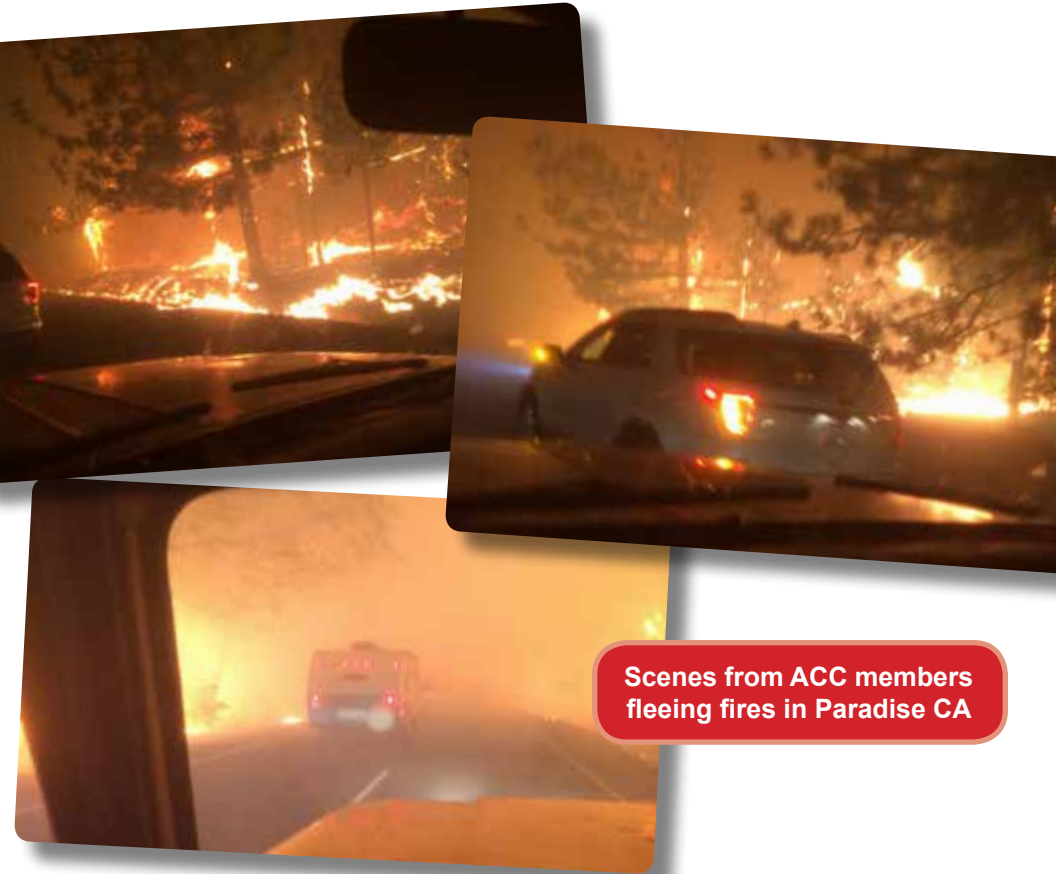

Last month a fire destroyed the town of Paradise CA, as many of you saw on the news. Grass Roots Club 142 Para-Pines Peggery played in Paradise every Thursday evening, and the updates that I have been told are that many club members lost their homes, but all thankfully survived this horrific event.

The ACC Executive Committee has taken a few steps to help the victims of the fires in Paradise and southern California. Any awards lost to fire—Grass Roots, internet, or weekend tournaments—will be replaced by the ACC at no cost to any of these members. We will contact Paradise club members soon to see which awards they would like us to replace.

Numerous people offered to send money in support of our friends in Paradise, so we set up a fund so you can either mail a check or donate online. The money will be distributed equally by the ACC directly to our Paradise members. I ask all of you who can help to please do so. See page 7 for information on how to donate.

The final thing that I want to share this month is about our younger members who

play in many clubs throughout the ACC. Our Grass Roots Policy Manual states:

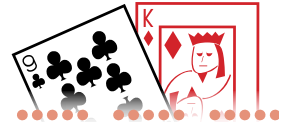
The participation of members *under* 21 years of age is permitted at the discretion of individual clubs *subject to individual state, county, and local regulations*. Individual clubs *may not* turn down Grass Roots membership for junior members based solely on age. It is recommended that acceptance be based on the youth's ability to play at the speed and skill level of the slowest members of the club.

Recently there has been some confusion of what exactly our policy is relating to kids, and so I ask all club directors that, if the location of your club allows youth, for you to also. With that said, it is expected that they play timely and not cause other problems. It is my belief that it is solely the parent's job to parent and not the director's. Parents know what is best for their child, so clubs should not refuse to allow youth to play without consulting parents.

Dan Zeisler and **Don Grumpy Howard** are in charge of youth cribbage and have done a tremendous job running tournaments and assisting teachers and others needing info on teaching children our wonderful game. So, if this situation comes up at your club, please use the title of this column: "Humble and Kind." If for some reason it turns out that a youth cannot play timely or other problems arise,

My Deal

Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

My heart goes out to the thousands of people in Paradise CA who lost their homes to devastating fires in early November. Because I have never experienced anything this traumatic, I really have no idea what it is like or what they are going through.

I can only imagine how demoralizing it must be to lose a lifetime of mementos and memories in a few minutes time as flames consume your house before your very eyes. And the harrowing flight to safety must have seemed like a scene from hell, as flames licked the tires of cars and smoke made vision—to say nothing of breathing—nearly impossible. (My thanks to **Allen Plowman** for providing the pictures on the cover.)

I have talked to several cribbage players in this region, and given the chaotic conditions it is not possible to get fully accurate information. As of November 20, one Paradise club member was still on the Butte County Sherriff's list of missing persons. We have been unable to contact three other club members, who may well be safe from harm, but unable to

contact family and friends. At least three houses of ACC members were burned to the ground, along with all their contents, while two other club members do not know if their houses are still standing.

Ridge Senior Center, the building where Para-Pines Peggys Club 142 played in Paradise, has been reported as destroyed, but no firm information is known at this time.

Tragedy brings out the best in people. And one thing I have learned about the ACC and its wonderful members is that we are nothing if not generous. Several GoFundMe accounts were quickly established on behalf of players we know. The ACC also created a GFM account for all of the players who lost homes or possessions during the fire.

Budgets are typically strained during the holiday season, but if you would like to donate to this very worthy cause, see the box on the next page.

Above all, please keep these players in your thoughts and hearts. **CW**

Tragedy in Paradise

The devastating fire in and around Paradise affected thousands of Californians, including many ACC members. Given the chaos, it is hard to get accurate information from ground zero. At least three houses of ACC members were burned to the ground, along with all their contents. Para-Pines Peggars Club 142 played at Ridge Senior Center in Paradise, and this building is reported as destroyed.

The ACC is reaching out to members affected by the fire. As the ACC's Executive Committee member in California, Paul Gregson is coordinating the financial side of this effort. The deadline for donations is December 31. All monies raised by this date will be sent to the ACC treasurer for deposit and then divided equally among those ACC members who have lost houses and belongings in the fire. (We are working to finalize the exact list of who was affected.)

In addition, the ACC's Executive Committee approved money to replace any cribbage awards (Bronze, Master, etc.) lost to the blaze. David Campbell and Mark Soule are in the process of reaching out to players to coordinate this effort.

Correction

Cribbage Primer

The ACC has two type of membership dues.

ACC dues expire on the one-year anniversary of when you sign up. If you sign up in June, your dues are due in June every year. The ACC membership secretary mails out membership cards in the middle of every month.

Grass Roots dues are valid for one Grass Roots season, which runs from September 1 through May 31. If you join a club in November, your dues (\$7) take you through May 31 of the next year—not to November. The first time you play club the following season—whether you are a traveler or have a home club—you have to pay GR dues again. Club directors should collect dues from any travelers and visitors with unpaid dues.

Cross-Check Satellite Scorecards

At the ACC's annual meeting in Milwaukee, the BOD voted—effective immediately—that scorecards for *all* satellite tournaments must be cross-checked. For small satellites, this requires cross-checking only a handful of scorecards and won't significantly impact a tournament director's time. For large satellites, to quote Western Region Tournament Commissioner **Rick Shea**, who sponsored this proposal, "there's too much money at stake to not cross-check."

HALL OF FAME NOMINATIONS

The ACC's Hall of Fame was established in 1982 to recognize members who excelled in playing the grand old game and/or contributed to the advancement of the American Cribbage Congress. Each year, the ACC membership is invited to nominate candidates worthy of inclusion in the HOF. Here are the nominating criteria:

1. Nominations must be submitted by mail or email (maximum of one side of a letter-size page) to the address below. Nominations may be made only by a current ACC member, and the nomination page must include the name of the person doing the nominating.
2. An individual nominated for the Hall of Fame must meet the following *mandatory* criteria. He/she must . . .
 - a. be a member in good standing for seven consecutive years or have been a member in good standing for a minimum of five consecutive years until death intervened.
 - b. have displayed and complied with the rules of ethical play.
 - c. have displayed and complied with standards of good sportsmanship.
3. In addition, to be eligible for nomination, a candidate is required to meet at least three of the following criteria. He/she must have . . .
 - a. promoted the game of cribbage and/or served the ACC by specific acts of accomplishment as specified in the nominating letter.
 - b. established his/her expertise by being rated a Master player or higher.
 - c. established his/her expertise by being rated Bronze Award or higher in the Grass Roots program.
 - d. served as a tournament director of

an ACC sanctioned tournament for a minimum of five years.

- e. served as a Grass Roots club director for a minimum of five years.
 - f. served as a member of the Board of Directors of the ACC for a minimum of four years.
4. Exceptions to or exemptions from the above criteria must be initiated by a current member of the BOD.

The call for HOF nominations appears annually in the December *Cribbage World*. Nominations must be submitted in writing and postmarked by January 10.

The HOF chairperson will review all letters of nomination for compliance with the nominating criteria and mail copies of each letter to the HOF voting panel (composed of twenty-five BOD members plus three panel members selected by each BOD member). The ballots will be counted in Reno prior to the March BOD meeting.

Nominees must receive 75% or more positive votes to be elected to the HOF. If no one receives 75%, then the one person (or persons, if a tie) who receives at least 65% of the votes will be elected to the HOF. Induction into the HOF will take place at the Grand National tournament.

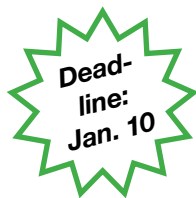

Cribbage Board of the Month

ACC member **Halley Georgeson** (Hawthorne CA) sent me an email and photos detailing two cribbage games played in 1943 on the USS *Wahoo* submarine while on patrol in the Yellow Sea. Halley was visiting the submarine museum at Pearl Harbor and thought the story would be of interest to *Cribbage World* readers. The story definitely piqued my interest.

After an internet search, I contacted **Nancy Richards**, curator at the USS Bowfin Submarine Museum. She sent me some photos and excerpts from the book *Wahoo: The Patrols of America's Most Famous WW II Submarine* by Richard H. O'Kane. I will try to keep the following story short and relative to cribbage and the experiences of USS *Wahoo* Executive Officer O'Kane.

On March 18, 1943, Commanding Officer Dudley Morton and Ex-

This article appeared in the April 2017 *Cribbage World* and is reprinted here with an update.

ACC member **Morley Curtis** (Whidbey Island WA) notified me that the submarine USS *Bremerton* has arrived in its namesake city for decommissioning. That means the O'Kane cribbage board will be passed on to the next oldest submarine in the Pacific Fleet. There will be a formal ceremony to move the board as the USS *Olympia* officially becomes "The Guardian of the Cribbage Board."

O'Kane's board is the most historic board I know of. If I could play a game on any cribbage board in the world, this would be the one!

Executive Officer Richard O'Kane were playing their regular evening game of cribbage while on patrol aboard

rear admiral in 1957. He passed away in 1994.

The story is not over however. Offi-

the *Wahoo*. Playing cribbage was a way to escape the tension of war patrols. During the game, Morton dealt O’Kane three 5s and the Jack of Spades. O’Kane cut the 5 of Spades for a perfect 29-hand. Within hours of that 29-hand, the *Wahoo* encountered and sank two Japanese ships.

On March 21 Morton and O’Kane sat down after breakfast for another game. With Morton dealing again, O’Kane scored a 28-hand. Shortly after, the *Wahoo* sunk a Japanese merchant ship.

On this one patrol, the *Wahoo* sank nine ships. After that, the men and officers considered the phenomenal cribbage hands to be good luck. The officers who had watched the games in the wardroom signed both sets of cards for O’Kane.

O’Kane went on to become commanding officer of the submarine USS *Tang*. On October 25, 1944, after a fierce battle and sinking several ships, the *Tang* was sunk. O’Kane was captured by the Japanese and held captive until the end of the war. O’Kane was later awarded the Medal of Honor for his daring attacks on two Japanese convoys during the *Tang*’s fifth and final patrol. O’Kane retired from the Navy at the rank of

cers and crew aboard the *Tang* had heard about the 29- and 28-hands and gave O’Kane a board to commemorate the games (see photo). A second *Tang* was built under the sponsorship of O’Kane’s wife Ernestine, and it became “The Guardian of the Cribbage Board.” When the second *Tang* was decommissioned, the cribbage board was passed to the USS *Kamehameha*, then the oldest submarine in the Pacific Fleet. Since then “The Guardian of the Cribbage Board” has been the USS *Parch*, USS *Los Angeles*, and USS *Bremerton*.

There is a ceremonial passing each time this cribbage board moves to the oldest submarine in the Pacific Fleet. Needless to say, the US Navy is steeped in customs, courtesies, rituals, and traditions. Rear Admiral O’Kane’s cribbage board has been keeping submarine and cribbage tradition alive for more than seventy years.

As all cribbage players know, in cribbage—unlike in poker—the Ace is *always* low. It can form a run with 2 and 3, but not with Queen and King—until now!

In this cribbage variant, the game is the same as normal cribbage except for Aces. Aces retain their one-point value for pegging, but in counting hand or crib, Aces are both the highest-ranking and lowest-ranking card. In fact, runs continue from the face cards to Ace to the numbered cards; thus, Q-K-A-2-3 is a run of five!

Other examples of hands with super-powered Aces are 3-Q-K-K-A (8 points), 5-Q-K-K-A (14 points), 6-K-A-A-2 (8 points), K-K-A-A-2 (16 points),



K-K-A-2-2 (20 points), and so on.

An interesting pegging play is J-Q-K-A, which yields six points: a run of four cards (J-Q-K-A) for four points plus 31-for-2!

Give this variety a trial run. Just remember that A-K and 2-K are no longer defensive tosses to the crib!

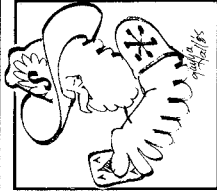

Johnny Cribbagedseed Winter visitor sows seeds of interest in card game

He has been tabbed "Johnny Cribbagedseed," a name of honor he does not take lightly because it took him more than half a lifetime to be worthy of the title. And, also, because he likes to play a card game called cribbage.

Joseph Petrus Wergin, who during the lunch hour (this was in the north country where it was too cold to go outside to play), and the youths became better math students.

Then, Wergin says it is a fun game — a social game. "Cribbage players have fun, visit with each other, except maybe in tournament play. They don't replay the game and worry about what cards they held, like bridge players. The game only lasts 15 to 20 minutes and they are ready to play again."

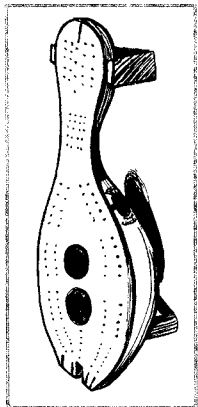
Wergin, now 77 years young, travels all over the United States and is justly proud that he is a member of a club of accomplishments connected with his favorite game. In 1979 he founded the American Cribbage Congress in Raleigh, N.C. The non-profit organization has more than 4,000 members and is recognized as the ruling authority for cribbage players across the country.

"Then, he wrote a book, 'How to Win at Cribbage,' a

British ever since.

The game's object is to accumulate points by getting combinations of cards that resemble those in poker. A typical game lasts 15 minutes and ends when one of the two players gets 121 points.

Many aficionados agree with Wergin when he declares that "cribbage is the



best game ever invented for two players."

The seven-one game is played with a standard deck of cards; a wooden cribbage board with holes and pegs is used to keep score. Players get six cards, two or which are discarded face down into



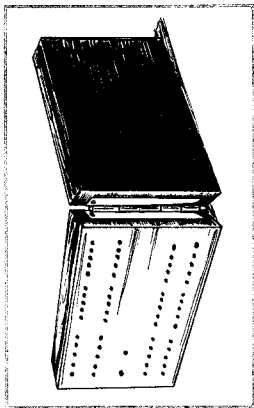
At first, the young boy still preferred the well-known family games of Sheephead and Skat to cribbage. Skat is a three-handed game of German origin and Sheephead is a trump game.

Later, Wergin began dating a young woman who preferred cribbage. His interest in the attractive girl grew at about the same rate as his interest in the game she so enjoyed. Soon they were married. He then decided that cribbage is the best two-handed game there is.

Wergin earned a bachelor's and a master's degree in education from the University of Wisconsin. His teaching career also included a stint as athletic director. But, regardless of his vocation, his avocation has always been cribbage.

The game was invented by a 17th-century British poet—Sir John Suckling. He created "cribbage" sometime between 1652 and 1659, building it upon the elements of an older game called "Noddy." It has been a favorite of the

complete, easy-to-read, step-by-step book, revealing the secrets of a master player. In fact, it contains all the tricks and secrets the author has attempted to score combina-

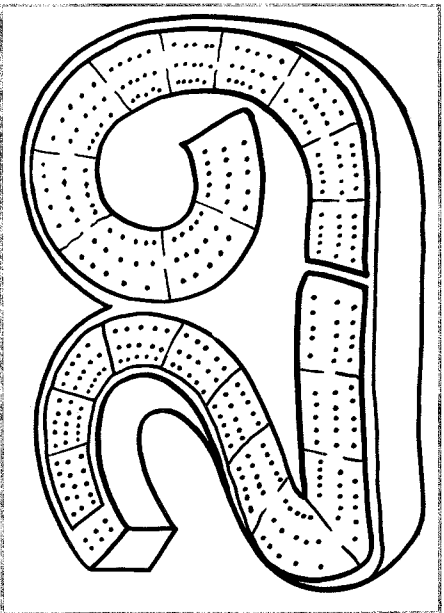


tions or pairs and straights.

Two of the things that Wergin discusses with animation are the fact that cribbage is a numbers game and that it is a relaxed, easy manual for the novice or intermediate player. All aspects are covered, from the popular variations of the standard six-card game to the organization of leagues

garmed during 50 years of experience and has proven to be a valuable reference guide for the advance player.

and the staging of tournaments. Incidentally, since 1945 Wergin has served as a consultant on Skat for Hoy's Official Rules of Card Games, which is published by the U.S. Playing Card Com-

pany. Since becoming an Arizona winter visitor, Wergin is excited to get people in this part of the country interested in cribbage. Two years ago he started a grass roots program of local clubs in which members would have the opportunity to play cribbage at least once a month in a relaxed social atmosphere.

He will stage a tournament at Venture Out Resort, 5001 E. Main, Mesa, and entries will be limited to 100 players. So far he has entries from Illinois, Oregon, Montana, Wisconsin, Texas and California.

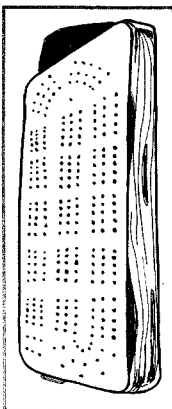
The first-time Arizona State Cribbage Tournament is set for Saturday and Sunday, Feb. 21 and 22. Registration will be from 7 to 8 a.m., briefing session from 8 to 8:15 a.m., and play will begin at 8:30 a.m. The lunch break will begin at 11:30 a.m. and play will resume again at 1 p.m. Sunday at 7:30 a.m., elimination and consolation rounds will be played, ending with a "last chance tourney" at 2 p.m.

Assuming 192 players register, there will be 24 awards with first place being pegged at \$1,000.

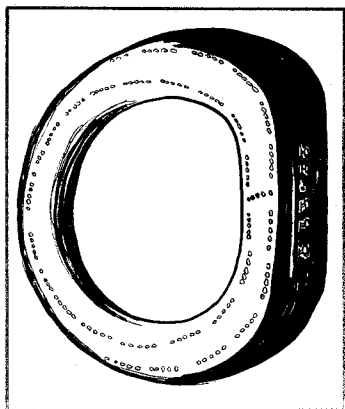

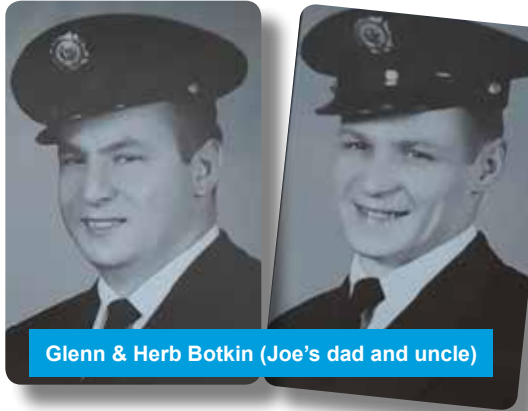

Glenn & Herb Botkin (Joe’s dad and uncle)



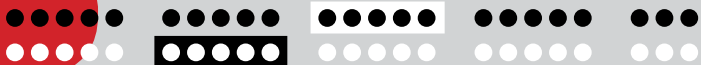
“Smokey” McGillivray, on a Eureka fire engine in the late 1950s

The Inside Track

Tip #3.2: offensive pegging on fourth street.

This month you are nondealer at hole 92 with the dealer at hole 85. What is your objective before even looking at the hand? To get as close to hole 100 without taking incredible risks.

You hold A-2-6-8 (discard 10-K), and the cut is a Queen. Without pegging you will be at hole 94. Not horrible but definitely not comfortable. So do you risk pegging offensively to get closer to 100—which in turn could bring the dealer much further down the board as well? I say yes.

You are more likely to deal yourself a below-average hand from 25 or 26 out than having the dealer go 36 pegs in three counts—especially when you have discarded 10-K to the crib. So lead the 8 and hope the dealer plays a 7. You can then take the three-card run plus the 31 if dealer makes it 30-for-4. So in that scenario you make it to hole 99 while the dealer gets to hole 92 before counting hand and crib—an acceptable tradeoff in my opinion.

Use your best judgement in pegging the next hand. If you have a 10–12 point hand, be cautious, especially on the opponent's lead card. But if you have only 4–6 points and you don't think your crib prospects are very good, match everything or get in runs. You need to get as close to hole 110 as possible to have a decent chance to win on the next deal.

ACC Cribbage Code of Congeniality

During a new player's trial period (four weeks or until they earn points—whichever is longer) . . .

- We pledge to welcome new players warmly and make them feel wanted.
- We pledge to not penalize new players for violating tournament rules. (We will, instead, gently tell them what the rule is and what the penalty would be.)
- We pledge to not let new players underpeg points or undercount hands. (We will, instead, explain errors and then allow new players to take all points they are entitled to.)
- We pledge to not make new players feel inferior if/when they miss points or make a bad play. (We will, instead, let them know that all cribbage players do this and that it is part of the learning process.)
- We pledge to not force new players to play a game in fifteen minutes. (We will, instead, be tolerant and not complain, remembering that we, too, started slow.)
- We pledge to allow new players to play for free or at the minimum cost of club expenses.

After the trial period is up . . .

- We pledge to continue to make all players—new and existing—feel welcome and comfortable at our club.

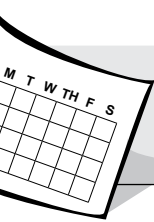
