Eleven-year-old Zack Gregson (Antioch CA), the youngest member of Club 54, started the Grass Roots season with a grand slam! Here are the players he beat in week one (he played a tenth game because of an odd number of players):

Zack beat ten players who averaged 4,095.4 MRPs (that's the Grand Master level) and 2,141.4 GRPs (over 85\% of the way to Silver Award), while at the same time he has exactly zero MRPs and only 12 GRPs!

When club started that night, they had an odd number of players, and Zack volunteered to go home to make it even, but his parents (Paul and Tammy Gregson) convinced him to stay. Good thing they did!

## The Inside Track

## 

Last month we discussed improving your game by remembering what two cards you discarded-every time.

Tip \#2: having a plan in mind before you play your first card is a key factor in cribbage success-especially on fourth street. One misstep can cost you a game. Let's examine a common situation.

You are nondealer at hole 86, and the dealer is at hole 80. You hold A-A-4-J and discard $10-\mathrm{K}$ to the crib. The cut is a 7 , so how would you approach pegging now? If the cut had given me 10 or 12 points I lead an Ace and hope to peg two or three points without assuming much risk, putting me around twenty holes out with three counts coming up. However, since the cut didn't improve my hand at all, I have to attack differently now.

I lead the Jack; if the dealer makes $15-2$, I play my 4 and hope he makes it 29 ; then I hope to run my Aces for 31-4. It is obviously a risky play but the value of picking up four points outweighs the potential disaster of the dealer holding a hand such as 2-3-4-5, which would be very unlucky since it's not a hand that the dealer would usually hold.

To sum up: weigh the risk-reward scenario when you are pegging close to fourth street. Be aggressive to get in good position, and be defensive if you are already in good position. Making good decisions here will improve your win percentage at least

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 five points. Above all, do not second-guess yourself at that point or overthink; that is when most poor decisions are made.

Next month's tip: understanding how pegging values change on fourth street.

## Play smart, play fair, play fast-but mostly play nice

At the Brat Stop Open in Kenosha WI on August 25, I sadly witnessed one reason why the ACC has lost members every year since 2007.

Two brand new players-I'll call them Mary and Charles-were attending their very first tournament. They were ideal candidates for ACC membership: a couple in their early 40 s who love cribbage and have enough disposable income to splurge on a weekend away from their two teenage daughters. Both of them learned the game over thirty years ago, but had played only casually with family and friends. Given the right circumstances, they could be ACC members for the next thirty years.

After losing with dignity throughout the day, in game seventeen the wheels fell off the wagon for Mary. She cut into a 20-point hand that would have been easy for many players to count. After struggling to count the hand for several minutes, she finally took 24 points, and this overpegging landed her in the game hole. Her opponent-an experienced tournament player-sat passively as Mary struggled to find the correct count, and then he called
a judge for false claim of game.
After the fifteen-point penalty was applied, Mary finished the game with a stiff upper lip, but in the next game the embarrassment and emotion of the situation got the better of her and she left the game-and the tourney-with the words, "I can't do this anymore."

I can think of two reasons why a veteran player would allow a neophyte to overcount/overpeg this hand-and then call a judge. The first reason is inexcusable: to steal a game he didn't deserve to win. I will give Mary's opponent the benefit of the doubt and not attribute this motive to him. But I will say this: anyone who exhibits this type of callous behavior is totally out of place in the ACC. If you are so desperate to win a game at any costeven at the risk of driving away a potential member-then you shouldn't be playing.

A second reason, while perhaps understandable, is nonetheless unacceptable: he didn't know how to handle this situation, so he simply reacted by doing what the rulebook says-call for judges when a player falsely claims a game.

I DARE YOU TO LOSE!
Perhaps one of the oldest cribbage variations is that where you try to lose! We all know the agony of 19-hands and 19-cribs, so someone-probably after losing a dozen games in a row or, more likely, after drinking a dozen beers!-decided to make the object of the game to lose.

Also known as Leasters, Least-ski Cribbage, Lowball Cribbage, Backward Cribbage, Reverse Cribbage, and probably other names not fit for a family magazine, the entire object of this cribbage variation is to not get points and to force your opponent into hole 121 .

To accomplish this, you break up double runs and 5-X combos in order to throw $5-5$ or 2-3 into their crib, and $9-\mathrm{K}$ into yours. Things get tricky when you deal yourself really good hands like 5-6-7-8-8-J or A-2-2-3-7-8, as you have to find a way to minimize the damage.

Since everything in Lowball Cribbage is reversed, when a Jack is cut, the pone has to take two points.

One advantage of playing Lowball Cribbage is that it will teach you defense, espeically how to avoid runs and traps.

So, if you want to get some big hands, try Lowball Cribbage. You are bound to get at least one 24 -crib before the game is over! CW

I fully understand the reason for the rulebook, and I support every rule in it, but there are times-this was one of them-when everything on pages 6-40 in the rulebook is upended by the first sentence on page 5: "Cribbage is a pastime that provides social opportunities to display true sportsmanship and respect for others, without rancor, animosity, or overwhelming self-interest during competition" (emphasis added).

The right thing to have done in this situation was to say "are you sure?" or "that's too many" or "check again" when Mary counted the hand as 24 . If she continued to overcount/overpeg the hand, he should have prevented her from pegging into the game hole. (If you're uncertain about how to do this, see page 21 of the May Cribbage World for an exemplary illustration of sportsmanship by Wilson Taguinod.) This is how to resolve this dilemma. This is what should have happened.

I can already hear the reaction from a certain cadre of members: "She has to follow the rules just like everyone else." And: "How do you decide which rules to apply to which people?"

This is very easy to answer: apply the rule that is in the best interest of the ACC. When faced with these two choic-es-(a) callously/unthinkingly enforce the false-claim-of-game rule or (b) help the ACC grow by not driving away a potential member-the choice is always clear.

If you still disagree with me, then let me put another spin on it. This may sound counterintuitive, but there are two very good selfish reasons to be nice. First, if the ACC's curmudgeons, pariahs, and shortsighted members run off all the newer members, the organization will wither away. Second, if you want to win money or see the prize fund grow, you need new players at tournaments, so be nice to new players and encourage them-instead of drive them away.

Disagree with me all you want, but the bottom line is that to grow the ACC, we need to attract and retain more members. If you are not contributing by actively bringing people to clubs and tournaments, at least be neutral by not driving away current and potential members.

And above all, always do what is in the best interest of the ACC. CW

## Cribbage Primer


#### Abstract

What to do when a player leaves in the middle of a tourney. (1) If a player leaves in the middle of a game, their opponent wins that game by 10 spread points, and a senior judge or the TD signs the scorecard. Exception: if a player leaves immediately before or during the last game of the qualifying round, the TD must provide a substitute opponent, and no forfeit is awarded. (2) If there are multiple games remaining on the scorecard (including the second game of a two-game set at tourneys that use the two-against-eleven format), the opponents do not get a free win. One of two options is available at this point. a The TD or senior judge must assign a substitute to play in place of the missing player, and these games are recorded on a separate scorecard; if either scorecard manages to cash or qualify on its own merits without taking the other partial card into consideration, then either player can be awarded the appropriate points and/or cash (assuming the first player left for an emergency and not for an unacceptable reason). If no substitute is available, the players who missed games should be paired against each other at the end of the tourney in order to play the required number of games.

## Youth Teaching rip

Last month, I wrote about one of the most difficult
concepts for young students of cribbage to grasp-the playing of one's cards during the pegging process, specifically the importance of leading into careless runs. This month, l'd like to address another area that teachers need to focus on-how to play intelligent cribbage on fourth street. Knowing how to correctly finish a game of cribbage is a critical step in becoming a good player. Without attention to this, new players tend to keep more points in their hand than necessary when close to the game hole, or to throw risky cards into their pone's crib that may help them get into position to win the game. My suggestion for teaching this is to have your class play a few games starting with their pegs on fourth street. Double up players, so they can share strategies, and by having four kids to a board, you have less games to monitor and can watch the choices they make and help when needed.

## Youth Hews

Over the past couple of years, membership in the ACC's youth program has grown significantly due to the increased number of youth tournaments and the development and implementation of the Youth Rating Point (YRP) system. From a handful of members three years ago, we currently have 102 active youth members. Youngsters must be ACC members in good standing in order to participate in sanctioned youth events and earn YRPs. Youth tournaments generate excitement among players and give youth an outlet to measure their skills against other players. Here are five things you should know about our youth program:

- There is no cost for a youth to become a member of the ACC.
- Youth can maintain youth status until their nineteenth birthday.
- Youth Rating Points may be carried over when one becomes an adult
- Youth tournaments can be easily piggybacked with an adult event. Contact Don Howard (grumpydopey@sbcglobal.net) for more information.

## Ruling Points

We were going to talk about a specific issue this month that was posted on Facebook, but the situation itself generated so much opinion and wide-ranging discussion that we will address some of the larger issues revealed in that post.

First, some judges are not prepared to rule on the nuances of the game, and some may not be ruling correctly on various situations. This means that the ACC needs to do a better job training judges.

Second, there are situations when you don't need to call
 for judges, as when both players agree on how to fix a minor rulebook infraction. A simple example is overpegging. When a player calls overpegging, the offender sees it, and they agree on the correct count, then you can adjust the pegs accordingly and don't need judges.

Unresolved disagreements, however, need two judges. Plus certain complicated infractions require that judges be called, either because of the severity of the infraction or because of its high impact on a game.

Judges need to really think about a situation you are called for and read the entire rule. Talk often about rules that you are fuzzy on, ask senior judges for their help, and if you are an experienced judge you should bring less experienced judges into calls, especially tricky issues, to inspire confidence and good reasoning.

Finally-and most important-remember that the rulebook exists to protect noncheaters. It is not a way for someone to use the rules to steal a game.

## ACC Cribbage Code of Congeniality

## During a new player's trial period (four weeks or until they earn points-whichever is longer) . . .

- We pledge to welcome new players warmly and make them feel wanted.
- We pledge to not penalize new players for violating tournament rules. (We will, instead, gently tell them what the rule is and what the penalty would be.)
- We pledge to not let new players underpeg points or undercount hands. (We will, instead, explain errors and then allow new players to take all points they are entitled to.)
- We pledge to not make new players feel inferior if/when they miss points or make a bad play. (We will, instead, let them know that all cribbage players do this and that it is part of the learning process.)
- We pledge to not force new players to play a game in fifteen minutes. (We will, instead, be tolerant and not complain, remembering that we, too, started slow.)
- We pledge to allow new players to play for free or at the minimum cost of club expenses.


## After the trial period is up . . .

- We pledge to continue to make all players-new and existing-feel welcome and comfortable at our club.

The 2017-18 season wrapped up on July 31, with tournaments on both coasts.

Life Master (3 $\star$ ) Erik Locke (Wood Village OR) finished strong to capture his third national championship. He previously sat atop the leader board in 2008 and 2014. This was Erik's tenth appearance on the All American team.

 (regional champions in bold)Both the number of and attendance at tournaments increased this season. The ACC sanctioned 193 mains last season and 181 consolations. As in previous years, the large majority of these tourneys are in the Western Region: 121 mains (62.7\%) versus 32 in the Central (16.6\%) and 40 in the Eastern (20.7\%).

Total tourney attendance rebounded from last season's low of 18,950 to 20,134 ( 12,519 in mains and 7,615 in consolations), meaning an average of 64.9 players per main and 42.1 per consy.

Mounted on wheels, it was declared to be the World's Largest Cribbage Board. (It is still on display at the Valley Club Lounge in Ronan MT.)

Opening the awards presentation was a one-game exhibition match on this huge board between two national champions: Jesse Jerrell and Phyllis Schmidt. With over two hundred spectators in the parking lot looking on, it was instantly a "guys against gals" match!

The four-foot-high pegs were moved by handpicked supporters from each side as Phyllis and Jesse called out their points. In the end, the ladies won! (Rumor has it that DeLynn won a beer by betting on Phyllis!)

Grand National 12 was a great success, as it went without a hitch and proved to be an all-ACC effort. This feat was accomplished by the determination of forty volunteers who helped Rex, DeLynn and Dick, without which GN12 would not have been. CW

In her third game, she dealt high qualifier and eventual winner Mattie Bradshaw (Sharpsburg GA) a 28-hand. Jim Horrigan (Thomaston GA) dealt Kelley a 28-hand in her sixth game. NEPT After a ten-year hiatus, the Northeast Peer Tournament is back. Formerly known as the New England Peer Tournament and under the directorship of John Chambers (Smithfield RI) for twenty-five years, the NEPT is now directed by Donald Janelle (Manchester CT). The basic concept is that players are arranged by lifetime MRPs, from low to high, and then placed in three rooms, according to MRPs. The beauty of this system is that newer players don't have to face Life Masters in the qualifying round. The playoffs are still composed of the two $25 \%$ of the scorecards from the entire field. This year, with roughly equal-sized rooms of 30,28 , and 20 , room $A$ (the highest MRPs) had
seven qualifiers, Room B (middle group) had six, and Room C (the lowest MRPs) had nine. The high qualifier and eventual winner of main, Marilyn Gaudreau (Ludlow MA), came from Room C.
