# My Deal



The National Open Cribbage Tournament, held annually in July at Raleigh NC, is the progenitor of the American Cribbage Congress. ("Progenitor" is a fancy way to say that if it weren't for the National Open the ACC wouldn't exist.) Begun in 1974, this tournament is the longest-running sanctioned tournament in the ACC.

During the 1979 tournament, several attendees—among them Joe Wergin, Jim Arblaster, and Nick Pond—began a discussion over Friday breakfast that resulted in the founding of the ACC a few months later. Nick Pond, the subject of this month's Hall of Fame sketch by Bill Campbell, was instrumental in both founding the ACC and helping it stay the course during its early years. It was thus only appropriate that Nick was inducted into the ACC's Hall of Fame in the inaugural slat of honorees in 1982.

Nick's tournament is still going strong: the thirty-fourth edition will be held in a couple of months on July 20–23. If

you've never played in the NOCT, don't miss another year. I fell in love with the match-play/double-elimination format of this tournament when I first attended it two years ago, and I plan to keep playing in it until either it or I turn 100.

My good friend George Bickford—longtime ACC member, tournament director, and BOD member—once told me that if he could go to only one tournament a year, it would be the NOCT. So if you like your cribbage straight up with no distractions—just you against your opponent—then George and I hope to see you in Raleigh in July. Here's how to register:

- go to cribbage.org
- click on "Schedule/Results" in the left column
- scroll to the bottom of the page
- click on "National Open"
- download the flyer
- send in your entry fee by July 13 (no walk-ins)

## More Western Region Thoughts

I wholeheartedly associate myself with the letter written by Graeme Gossett that ap-

peared in the April Cribbage World concerning the necessity for a fourth region. As Graeme noted, the West has as many players as the other two regions combined. It is a classic case of underrepresentation. Not only is this unfair to the East and Central in terms of the number of tournaments, it is equally unfair to the West players in BOD representation, where the ratio of ACC members per BOD member greatly exceeds that of the East and Central. Similar to states and other political entities, as population shifts, so too ought representation. Also, the West produces, by far, a superior number of MRP generators (not superior players). For example, page 20 below indicates that the 10th player in the Central would be 25th in the West, while the 10th player in the East would rank 37th in the West. An additional region would equalize the representation and tend to smooth out the MRP phenomenon as well as permit more players to play in the All Star Tournament and vie for other ACC awards. There is no doubt that creating the fourth region would generate administrative and financial issues. Still, the need for an additional, population-based region is so compelling that I believe it should take first priority. Solving the additional problems, while, not simple, is, I believe, eminently doable. I have some thoughts on this and would be pleased to discuss them with anyone interested.

### **Grass Roots Scoring System**

The new Grass Roots point system that starts in September is long overdue. The Grass Roots organization was intended to provide local friendly competition and at the same time learn the finer points of cribbage. It was also thought that this would provide a venue from which players would feed into tournaments in which MRPs were given. In short, weekend events would be more competitive tournaments for those who were better at playing the game. Quite the contrary happened: under the current Grass Roots rating system it is more difficult to obtain rating points and the competition is greater. So everyone has had this whole thing bass-ackwards. In the final analysis, Grass Roots players are not a bad lot when it comes to playing cribbage and excelling at the game—this in spite of not being recognized by the ACC for their accomplishments and having been treated as somewhat of a stepchild for many years. Roger Wilson notes that the change in how Grass Roots points were given was done in the mid-80s; it was really done in the mid-90s and was done entirely by Joe Ramos. It was quite a chore for which Joe never received credit.


# Mike Habighorst Masters **Mick Michaelis**



The ACC Internet Committee and its Tournament Directors (TDs) are a small group of volunteers who work very hard to make sure that the ACC has internet tournaments. The Internet Committee was formed about two years, before the start of our first season. For the first four or five months, we "met" monthly on the internet, and then we began meeting nearly every Monday evening until the internet tournament program got up and running. Presently, the committee has four active members, with Mike Schell (Seattle WA) serving as an occasional consultant. We are looking for volunteers to join our committee.

Statistician Don Ellis compiles the Internet Rating Points (IRPs) for each tournament and maintains monthly and annual updates for all ACC members. Don is also one our dedicated TDs. As a tournament director, Don enters players into the tournament, assigns the brackets, and manages the tourney flow throughout. Don says that the reason he does this is that it keeps him off the streets and out of trouble—and it's fun! Don says, "I constantly remind myself that on the other side of my screen there is a large variety of people that share my interest in cribbage and come to my tournaments to take a break from the rigors of life and enjoy the competition and camaraderie from the comfort of their own homes." Don

retired from the Air Force after twentysix years, and he currently teaches high school science and mathematics in San Antonio TX.

Assistant statistician Lois Fosdal reviews and validates all the ACC internet registrations and screen names. # **Nick Pond**

"If I didn't love him, I'd kill him."

We all can think of friends who fit that mold, but I doubt that anyone had it said more about himself than Nick Pond, one of the great fathers of the American Cribbage Congress.

I met Nick in 1975 after receiving a news release in the Public Affairs office at Pope AFB, NC. A buddy and I played weekly at Pope (and "weakly" in retrospect), so we decided to make the drive to Raleigh. In those days there were no hard liquor bars so people brought their own bottles. My pal and I had a bottle of Chivas, something not lost on Nick and his pals, who were at the next table. We were quickly summoned over.

And that began a friendship that lasted until Nick died on December 12, 1993. It was the love of the game that brought so many into Nick's circle, not to mention the love of life that Nick celebrated so magnificently.

He'd come to Raleigh as a basketball player for North Carolina State in 1955 in the newly formed Atlantic Coast Conference, his first "ACC." Coach Everett Case had a championship team, and the native of Evanston IL was part of it.

Following graduation he stayed in Raleigh, and had he not, it's doubtful our ACC would look like it does. You see, Nick ended up as a sportscaster for WRAL-TV, and having covered the many great tournaments in golf-crazed North Carolina, he decided we needed a national tournament for cribbage. So he started one and attracted 165 players to the WRAL studios for the first tourney in 1974.

The original name of the tournament was to have been the U.S. Open Cribbage Tournament, but much to his dismay, Nick found that "U.S. Open" had been copyrighted by the golf guys. So "National Open" it became.

Nick was in the right place in 1979 when Joe Wergin gathered a few of us together and asked for ten bucks. I handed him a ten-spot and he said, "Congratulations, you're on the board for the American Cribbage Congress." I said, "What's that?" And he said, "We don't know yet, be at my breakfast meeting."

Nick nurtured the game at every level. Sometimes at earsplitting decibel levels.



Given the requisite amount of beers, he could be the most abrasive guy in town,

but as his ex-wife Linda once told me, "He will spend two hours looking for the perfect Mother's Day card."

Well, Nick was there every step of the way through the embryonic days of the ACC, serving in any capacity asked for and raising hell about things he wasn't asked for. He was passionate about the game and, perhaps more importantly, about the camaraderie it engendered. Many a Sunday afternoon was spent playing crib with his buddies in a Raleigh joint named the Player's Retreat. The owner gave Nick a key and players would keep track of their beers. That's the same joint where I once saw Nick in a four-handed game say "go" at 28 while holding three aces.

Like I said, "If you didn't love him. . . .

But you can get **21 points** by holding 5-10-J-Q suited or 5-J-Q-K suited and cutting another 5. Now that's some flush!

Here's the answer to last month's Cribbage Quiz—what is the maximum number of points you can end up with if your hand is blank before the starter card is turned? There are lots of ways to end up with 7, 8, or 9 points when you start with nothing, but if you hold nonsuited 4-6-J plus either 10-Q-K as your fourth card and cut the 5 that matches the Jack, you'll end up with 10 points. If these same four cards are in the crib but this time suited—which qualifies as a blank crib until the fifth card of the same suit is turned—you'll go from zero to 15 points. 

Rule of the Month-this month features a procedure question from an anonymous member, who writes: Two players are fairly close to each other as they approach third street. But as they turn the corner, player A inadvertently and unknowingly switched streets and continued (or so he thought) to approach fourth street. Play continued, and when both players were about 15 pegs from the out hole, they discovered that player A was actually on first street, even though he never pegged backwards; he always moved the pegs forward and then switched streets. Player A called for a judge. Two judges questioned both players, and all agree that player A had made the error when rounding the corner from second to third street. Player B was noncommittal when asked if he was aware of the incorrect placement of player A's pegs. The judges reviewed the rule book and could find nothing that covered this problem, and so they made the decision to let player A move his peg from first street to fourth street, using the positioned hole (15 pegs from home).

No penalty was assessed. Needless to say, player B was upset, but since he was a new-comer, he did not take issue with the ruling. My question is this: What penalty should have been assessed? Why isn't this situation covered in the rule book?

Herschel Mack (chairperson of the Rules Committee) responds: This situation is covered (sort of) on page 26 in the rule book under rule 8.9 (Recording Score in Wrong Track): "If a player records an otherwise correct score but places the peg in the wrong track on his or her side of the board or in opponent's track, it shall be moved to the proper track without penalty." I would judge that this is what happened initially, although after the first time it happened, he is actually back pegging! I think that the judges ruled fairly, although I'm not certain that every set of judges would have ruled the same way. It should have been caught much earlier by either player and corrected closer to the first time it occurred. Then there would not have been any difficulty in making this ruling.

Have pegs will travel—have you ever been traveling on business or vacation and wondered if there was a Grass Roots club in the area? Now there is an easy way to find out. Go to cribbage.org; click on "Local Clubs" in the left column; and then click

on "wonderful map" in the middle of the page (the map will take a few minutes to load if you have a dial-up modem). This will connect you to the Community Walk map of ACC Grass Roots clubs. Designed to be intuitive, it takes just a few minutes

to learn how to navigate the map. A tabbed menu on the left contains a complete list of Canadian and U.S. clubs sorted by state and city. And the interactive map features "mouse-over" and zoom capabilities. Popup balloons give contact information, driving directions, and club web sites. Not only is this map informative but it's fun to play with! *submitted by Tracy Yott*

Everything You've Always Wanted to Know about Cribbage (But Were Afraid to Ask)

In 1969 Dr. David Reuben published *Everything You Always Wanted to Know About Sex (But Were Afraid to Ask)*—one of the first sex manuals to enter mainstream culture. (It's okay—you can admit that you read it.) Now, nearly forty years later, *Cribbage World* is going to perform a similar service and tear back the covers from the equally important sport of cribbage.

So, what do you want to know? If you have questions about anything related to cribbage—how something works in the ACC, why a cribbage rule exists, what a particular cribbage hand is worth—send them to cribbage@iserv.net.

We start this month with a very basic question: What is the ACC?

While some people may naively think that ACC means the Atlantic Coast Conference or Alpine Club of Canada, in every right-thinking society it stands for the American Cribbage Congress. Founded in 1980 for the primary purpose of protecting players from unscrupulous tournament directors, the nonprofit organization is dedicated to making the game of cribbage fun and fair for people of all ages.

The ACC sponsors three venues for playing cribbage:

- weekly Grass Roots clubs
- · sanctioned weekend tournaments
- internet tournaments
   Every week 165 local Grass Roots clubs

attract 2,400 players to their tournaments. Information about clubs is included in the Grass Roots Corner on page 28, written and edited by **Tom Lewis** (NM). To find a club near you, go to cribbage.org and click on "Local Clubs" in the left column.

During the 2005–2006 season, over 16,000 players attended 165 sanctioned tournaments throughout the United States and Canada. For a list of upcoming events, see the Tournament Trail on the next page or go to cribbage.org and click on "Schedule/Results" in the left column.

Internet tournaments sponsored by the ACC are gaining in popularity, especially among members who cannot easily travel to local clubs or sanctioned tournaments. 

## Feelin' Ragged(y)?

Cribbage, like many other games, has specialized terminology. Here are a couple of terms that every cribbage player should know.

### Raggedy Ann











When no flush is involved, a hand composed of A-A-6-7-8 equals 13 points: four 15-2 combos (8 points), a pair (2 points), and a run of three (3 points). If you hold A-6-7-8 suited and cut one of the remaining Aces, add 4 points for a total of 17 points; this suited version of the Raggedy Ann is sometimes called a Royal Ann.

## Raggedy Andy











When no flush is involved, a hand composed of 2-2-6-7-8 equals 11 points: three 15-2 combos (6 points), a pair (2 points), and a run of three (3 points). If you hold 2-6-7-8 suited and cut one of the remaining Deuces, add 4 points for a total of 15 points. Even though logic would dictate that this hand be called a Royal Andy, I've never seen this term in print.

Since these hands can be hard to count, you should learn to recognize them by sight. When no flush is involved, it doesn't matter which cards you hold and which card you cut, the Raggedy Ann will always be 13 points, and the Raggedy Andy will always be 11 points. Lay these cards out and study them until you can recognize them in your sleep. If you play a lot a cribbage, you'll see them often, and it speeds the game up if you can recognize them at a glance.
