President's Column James Morrow

There are several long-match tournaments happening. If

June Already?! you haven't heard of this, a long match consist of at least twenty games. Contestants are put in brackets by blind draw. The scoring is a little different: 3 points for a 31+ point win, 2 points for a win, and 1 point to loser if the loss was by five points or less (in addition, of course, to the 2 points awarded the winner). Disregard plus/minus spread points.

In some long matches you must win by three points. If tied, the match continues for eternity or until a player wins two games or gets a skunk.

In other formats, the winner is the player in the lead after a set number of games. In the event of a tie, the players decide the winner with a best of five playoff match.

Each player has a scorecard and keeps a running tally of points for both players. Some players play the entire match, while others will play a set number of games and meet however many times it takes to complete the match. These are fun tournaments, and we will look forward to seeing the results.

How long would it take you to play a twenty-game set? June ALSO means the Grass Roots season is finished and the club champions have been decided.

In case you didn't know, by becoming club champion, not only do you have bragging rights for a year, but you also get an invitation to the Tournament of Champions in Reno NV, but that's not all folks! You also are now invited to play in the Grass Roots Tournament of Club Champions. This tournament is played at the Grand National tournament and is a nine-game event vs. nine different club champions. There are no playoffs (just like Grass Roots). Rick Baird, the new director, wants everyone to know there is something else new to this event: anyone who has ever been a club champion is eligible to play in the GRTOCC.

June also means the ACC youth are wrapping up another year of school, and for some they are moving on to higher education. The link for youth scholarship forms is online at cribbage.org, or you can email the29seeker@yahoo.com for the form. The ACC would love to help our young players further their education.

Henry Douglass



I'm still saddened over the passing of Henry Douglass last week. I won't pretend Henry was the most popular person in the ACC. He was a polarizing figure, without a doubt. And most of that was by his own design. But I was lucky enough to see a side of him that many others did not.

I first met Henry over a decade ago at the National Open in Raleigh. It was my second tourney ever, so I knew only a few people from my Grass Roots club. I spent much of my downtime in the hospitality suite that Henry ran. Just helping out where I could, but mostly staying out of the way. I started traveling to a lot of tournaments, especially on the East Coast, so I saw Henry often. At one of the tourneys, he invited me to dinner on a Saturday night. Over a great meal and a few cocktails, I saw just how funny, witty, kind, generous, and charming he could be. I was lucky enough to join him for Saturday night dinners a handful of times during my early cribbage years. And at some points he would let his guard down (the cocktails helped), and I saw something else in him as well. I saw that he was sensitive and had his own insecurities. And there was also some hurt and sadness.

I had heard many of the Henry stories through the years (some of which came with subsequent rule changes). And Henry recounted many of these stories to me, just as I had heard them. He even recounted one that happened when he and I played in a playoff match. He had the details spot on, as he laughed about how much he enjoyed winding me up that day. All I could do was laugh, as I realized so many of his

antics were just to amuse himself. But he also told me stories where he felt unjustly slighted, and that's where the sadness crept in. I have no allusions that Henry didn't



bring some of this on

himself. But there were a few things that had hurt him. But he would never show it.

I haven't played nearly as much cribbage as I would have liked the last few years. Sometimes life just gets in the way. I had a few Saturday night dinner invites over the last couple of years, but the timing never worked out. And now those dinners will never happen. I'll miss his stories. I'll miss the face he'd make when he wasn't sure if something you said was either genius or batshit crazy. I'll miss how every terrible joke he told was funny because of his Southern drawl and slow cadence. "How do you make an apple turnover? You puuuuush it down a hill."

On paper, Reidsville, North Carolina, was home for Henry. But everyone who knew him knew his true home was on the road, heading to the next cribbage tournament. So it seems apropos he left us doing just that. Doesn't make it suck any less, but it does make sense in some weird way. I'm glad I wandered into the hospitality room that night in Raleigh. Rest easy friend, it was a great ride.

He writes: "I think my mind is okay for cribbage, but my eyes may take a while. Seeing double. Maybe I can get my first 58-hand!" I look forward to the return of CBOM as soon as Jay feels up to the task.



Switching gears, I want to acknowledge the passing of two cribbage giants, both of them from North Carolina.

While waiting for takeoff at O'Hare Airport on my way to Deadwood SD, a flight attendant asked if I was David. When I said yes, he handed me an envelope and said it was from a passenger in the rear of the plane. I immediately recognized the handwriting ■ as belonging to the redoubtable Henry Douglass. I didn't

see Henry get off the plane (he was moving rather slowly), but knew I'd see him on the shuttle or at the hotel and could thank him then.

Henry never arrived. On his way to the tournament in a rental car, near Mount Rushmore and probably on his way to see Crazy Horse Memorial (his favorite monument), he suffered a fatal one-car accident. He died doing what he liked best:

traveling to a tournament, thinking about cribbage, planning for his next pool.

We'll never again hear "Siiiiide Pool" in Henry's inimitable Southern drawl. We'll never again see Henry spread out the deck as he draws to determine the dealer. We'll never again see Henry's miniscule zero ◀ (a dot, actually) on the scorecard as his



way to protest the requirement to write two digits.

Henry's famous winner-take-all side pool was the subject of an article in the May 2022 *Cribbage World*, page 21. In his honor, at the Deadwood cluster we ran three "Henry Douglass Memorial Side Pools," one in each main. Henry's family donated his entry fees (which would

have been refunded to his estate) as seed money for each pool. I am honored to have split the very first HDMSP with **Rob Medeiros** when we were the last two pool players left in the Deadwood Open main.

Even in his last moments, this Life Master (★) was thinking of others. The envelope that he passed to me on the plane contained a picture (next page) and a note ➡ in Henry's scrawl relaying a cribbage anecdote for publication in *Cribbage World*,

transcribed here for easier reading:

Plaque for Mike Lund (FWB) (Fort Walton Beach FL)

Here's some trivia for the ACC? And CW?

Mike had played at home and in bars but not in the ACC for forty years (±). Most in FWB.

Mounted by Henry Douglass, Reidsville, NC, for Bill Campbell (FWB) to give to Mike Lund around December 2011.

At the Jan. 2023 FWB tournament I, Henry Douglass, was talking to 3 or 4 people about this happening. When I finished one of the people said, "Hey—that was me." So that I finally got to meet the one that I made the plaque for—12 years later!

One more Henry story. At my own Grand National in Grand Rapids MI in 2009, while my codirector, **Jeff Shimp**, was making announcements, I was in the registration area ensuring everything was ready to go. Making one last sweep looking for side pool entrants, Henry buttonholed me for \$20. I reached in my pocket and literally found only a ten, a five, and two ones. I apologized and said I couldn't enter. Henry said: "I'll pay your three dollars." I never thought about it again until after the playoffs when Henry said I had won his pool! I gladly gave him a tip and repaid the \$3!

Say what you want about Henry—yes I've heard t h e stories, yes I've seen the actions—but deep down, Henry had a heart. (See confirmation of this in **Chris Leishear**'s letter on page 5.) For many years, Henry bought a commemorative board for Grand National directors. The one that Henry gave me in 2009 has a prominent place in my collection. It really don't know how long Henry did this; if any other GN directors have similar boards, please send a picture to **cwed152@gmail.com**.)

This brings me to the passing of a second cribbage giant: Life Master Russell Perkins (Bear Creek NC). *Cribbage World* doesn't have many details right now, and we will undoubtedly print a proper memorial for Russ in a future issue, but in the meantime I want to highlight a funny connection between Russ and Henry, both of whom had an outsized influence on North Carolina cribbage for decades.

In the run-up to the thirty-fifth National Open in 2008, and as a means of increasing the prize fund, Russ decided to double any contributions donated for this cause. Henry, being Henry, decided to get involved, and well, here's the story:

This past month was a sad one for the ACC. Any life taken from us leaves a hole. The lives of Henry and Russ leave gaping fissures across the cribbage landscape.

May they rest in peace. CW

Deep Pockets?

While Grand Master **Russ Perkins** (Bear Creek NC) didn't invent cribbage, rumor has it that he was the first person to mug **Sir John Suckling**.

The National Open Cribbage Tournament in Raleigh NC is not quite as old as Russ, but it will hold its 35th edition on July 25–28. When a friend recently offered to donate money to the prize fund to help make NOCT 35 special, Russ magnanimously said that he would match any such contributions.

The story became a bit more interesting when Life Master Henry Douglass (Reidsville NC) got involved. Henry—who seldom misses an opportunity to "help"

his friends—decided to collect and match NOCT contributions— and then pass the doubled total on for Russ to match!

So here's the deal: wanna see how deep Russ's pockets are? Want to watch your money grow faster than the dot-com bubble in the late 1990s? If so, donate first to Henry, who will match your contribution before turning the money over to Russ for a second doubling.

Club 307 (Colorado Springs CO)—on May 1. Connie Halstead and Chris Petersen both achieved a perfect card! Chris captured first place with 20/9 +168, and Connie was second with 19/9 +176. What a way to finish off the season!

After reading the story above, Cribbage World wondered just how often two slams occur at the same club on the same day. As it turns out, double slams are more common than one might think. Going back to the 2003/2004 season (the earliest season we have electronic records for), it has happened at least once almost every season, and forty times total. Interestingly, the first recorded instance of a double slam was also at Club 307. On 10/22/2003, **Sharon Pierce** won with 20/9 +141, and Roland Beuttenmuller took second with 18/9 +163. This is the only other occurrence of a double slam at Club 307. Thanks to Grass Roots programmer Scott Harker for providing these stats.

Scott's Peek at the Past

When Hall of Famer Erik Royland Locke won the JPW/ACC Open in March, it prompted me to think about victories in major tournaments. For this month's column, I researched all the main winners in major tournaments in ACC history.

Much like tennis and men's golf, the American Cribbage Congress has four majors: the National Open in North Carolina, the ACC Open and Tournament of Champions in Nevada, and the Grand National, which rotates between the three regions each year. For sake of this discussion, I included the National Open since its inception in 1974 (which predates the ACC) and also included the TOC and ACC Open since they began in the early 1980s, even though the first couple of years they were small tourneys. There have been a total of 170 major tournaments:

- 48 National Opens
- 41 ACC Grand Nationals
- 41 Tournament of Champions
- 40 ACC Opens

As we examine the main tourney winners of these major tournaments, you have to go right back to **Erik Royland Locke**. Erik has won an incredible *five* of these majors: two Opens, two TOCs, and one Grand National, all within seventeen years. Locke has competed in 52 Major tourneys and won five of them, and he is only forty years old. *Amazing!*

There is one other ACC legend who has won more than two Major tournaments, and that is the late great Warren Sondericker. Warren was champion twice of the ACC Open and also won a Grand National, all in the space of thirteen years!

I also wish to recognize twenty players who have each won two major tournaments, a very good accomplishment. In reverse alphabetical order, these two-time major champions are:

Also, 122 players have claimed one major main tournament title.

In conclusion, there are many great excellent cribbage players who have not yet won a major. For instance, thirteen of the top twenty lifetime MRP leaders have never won a major, even though they have each won several tournaments and earned at least 22,000 MRPs. So, keep trying, and good luck pegging!

Scott knows so much ACC history because he has done just about everything in the ACC: BOD member, VP, president, national MRP champ x2, All American x7, tournament director, and youngest person elected to the ACC's Hall of Fame. He even has the letter he got from Nick Pond for his first NOCT.

Ruling Points by Keith Widener

Counting Aid?

Recently I went on the Transatlantic Cribbage Cruise and played in five tournaments while at sea. These tournaments were superbly run by Winona and Mike McDaniel along with Troy Thorson and Kathy Pacocha. Thanks for all their hard work and organizational skills making these tournaments happen.

While in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean, Megan Player came up to me and said: "I have the perfect idea for your next column." Since I am always looking for material, I listened to her and now I am writing it up.

At a recent tournament in Reno, a player was using their ink pen to point which direction they were supposed to be pegging. You have probably seen people do this—I know I've seen it. When they go around the corner from second to third street, they flip the pen so that it points the correct way for pegging. Of course this is to help prevent them from pegging backward.

So someone raised the question whether this is a violation of the rules, and judges were summoned. The Judges at that time ruled that it was a violation of Rule 9.5 which reads: No aid from an individual or from the use of any material may be used to assist in determining

scoring while pegging or counting the hands or crib.

I can see where someone might interpret using the ink pen as an aid in knowing which direction to peg, but I'm here to tell you that it is *not* a violation of the rules. We want people to peg in the correct direction. That is why many of our tournament boards have arrows printed or handwritten on them. We are not trying to make cribbage about who can catch their opponent in making the most mistakes and especially pegging backward; that's not cribbage—it's being a cutthroat. The intent of that rule should be obvious: you cannot get help counting and pegging your points from any person, place, or thing other than your own brain. Using your pen as a pointer to help remember the correct way to go is just fine.

The ACC Code of Ethics also makes it unethical to allow an opponent to continue pegging backward after the initial occurrence(s). If they peg backward, you need to tell your opponent that they did so. If you don't, and they continue to peg backward, you are risking ethics action. If you feel you need to win cribbage games off the mistakes made by your opponents, then perhaps you need to find a new hobby.

Seriously people, let's have fun.

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros





One of the most fascinating aspects of cribbage (end-game pegging in particular) is how a one-hole difference can totally change one's strategy. Let's look at a recent hand featured on dailycribbagehand.com.

You are the pone with the score tied at 118. You are dealt 5-7-J-Q-Q-K-what's your hold? I would hold 7-J-Q-K and lead the 7. The dealer cannot immediately take 15-for-2 for fear of you having a 6 or 9 to win the game, so he will have to be very careful. Obviously we are still pretty vulnerable with only three picture cards left and will require some luck to win, but I think this is the best path to that result.

Now let's move the pone and dealer peg one hole ahead so they are both at 119. Now what's your hold? I would hold 5-7-Q-Q and lead a Q. My reasoning? Well, a Q lead loses to five cards (two Queens and three 5s). The 7 lead that was so useful with dealer three holes out is a great liability with dealer two out (at least as a lead card). It will still provide pegging flexibility later in the pegging sequence, and it might even win us the game on the second play if the dealer doesn't have a 5 or Q. A middle card would be a likely response in that case.

So when you're in these situations remember exactly how many pegs you and the dealer need, and plan your strategy accordingly.

At fourteen, I watched my father and his friends play. One day I accepted the challenge. Mind blown, I could not sleep, lying in bed

Jason Shumate (Paradise CA) Life Master (★) with 15s flashing through my head. I played the 1995 World Championship just before my eighteenth birthday and joined the ACC soon after. In my early years, many weekends were

spent with my idol: Jesse Jarrell. His trophy room was glorious. Both my motivation and my antagonist, he would ask why I was upset with a loss: it's past, so learn from it and move on. Other times he would remind me that "if I were a better player!" When Jesse pushed me to make All American in 1998, I was the youngest to do it—a record that still stands. With a high qualifying card at the Pacific Coast Championship, I earned my One Star, and

winning the tourney gave me my twentieth win. I was club champion in 2018–19 at Lincoln City Puffins Club 420. I am currently a member of Oro-Dam Peggers Club 154. My toughest opponent? I can answer that many ways: I got coached by Craig Smith, rolled down the hall by Roland, steered into the ditch by Darlene, and taken down by Big Bob Cox, not once but twice! Even my own son killed two grand slams for me this year. Every day I play Bethany Rolfson a high stakes match for the Silver Scoop. Losing earns you litter box duty (aka my Zen garden!). Winning a consy on Friday, then winning the two-day main in Sutherlin and getting my picture taken with **both** Brumleys was by far my favorite moment this year.

Bob's older brother Chuck taught him how to play cribbage. He joined the ACC in 1990, and his cribbage mentor was DeLynn Colvert. Previously a member of Club 156 in Sunnyside WA and now a member of

Club 62 in Roseburg, he has been club champion three times. Bob won his first tournament at the 1991 Summer Open in Portland OR and now has eighteen wins. He earned his One Star ranking

at the Reno consolation; he had to play his wife in the first round and when he beat her, he hit his new rank. Bob's favorite tourney is the ACC Open in Reno. His toughest opponents are Erik Locke and Betty Brumley. His favorite cribbage moment this year was beating Erik in Depot Bay to take first place. Bob enjoys poker and grandkids.





An ex-girlfriend taught me to play cribbage when I was twenty-five, but she never let me win a game. I'd like a rematch now! I joined the ACC in 1995. When I'd get a hotel room for a tournament, DeLynn

Scott A. Milo (North Bend OR) Grand Master Colvert would ask "for a piece of the carpet" for him and his sleeping bag. Over some terrible rotgut bourbon (he was, shall we say, frugal), we would play many games for a "flat five," as

DeLynn would say. He once said to me: "In cribbage, being predictable is both an asset and a liability. Figuring out how and when to use that knowledge is another key to a winning strategy." Currently a member of Bandon by the Sea Club 440, I have been club champion eight times at five different clubs. I earned my Grand Master in

Eureka CA when I was high qualifier and finished second to Rolland Hall, which gave him his 75th win at the age of 75! My favorite tourney is any that Rick and Peggy Shea host! My toughest opponents are Erik Locke, Rich Ekman, and Roland Hall. Non-cribbage interests are fishing and crabbing on Coos Bay. When people ask why I moved to Oregon, I answer: "ACC cribbage!" When Jones Hom and I traveled to Oregon to play in tournaments, I was always thinking: "Oregon is so pretty; when I retire from the USAF, I am going to move there."




