This saying rings true in life and particularly for us as cribbage players. I played in the Grass Roots Regional Tournament this weekend, and I felt like I was definitely the bug. As my opponents advanced, I couldn't seem to get out of their way. I was dealt 2-4-10-J-Q-K needing six points to win. I threw 2-4 to my opponent's crib, cut a 9, and then couldn't peg one point. This pattern continued throughout the afternoon. I watched twenty-point leads disappear, and the only time the cribs worked out was when I threw cards to my opponent.

I truly felt like the bug that day, and even though it wasn't what I had hoped for, I also realized that I have had great success too. In every tournament, whether Grass Roots, internet, or sanctioned, we will be both windshields and bugs. While we all enjoy recording 2- and 3-point wins, we also have to record those "splat 0,

splat 0" moments. We have to remember that we can't always be the windshield, as the cards just won't allow for it. Sometimes being the bug can be comical, and maybe it becomes a learning opportunity. Sometimes being the bug means missing qualifying by one game or even by spread points, and those are hard to laugh at. But we need to know that our turn at being the top qualifier is as close as the next opportunity we get to play this awesome game.

## My Deal



#### Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice**

This story started when **Tom Kilcoyne** (Collegeville PA) emailed me on May 14 with the subject line "Found cribbage mentioned in a book . . . an old book." His email had five short paragraphs:

Author = Fyodor Dostoyevsky

Book = The Idiot

Year = 1868

The character = Vladimir Doktorenko (nephew of Lebedev)

The passage = "I had 20 roubles & lost them gambling to a blackguard (we were playing cribbage)."

Since cribbage is not a Russian game, I was immediately suspicious of the reference. Having been an editor of academic books for forty years, I knew I had to fact-check this quotation, so I pulled my copy of *The Idiot* from my bookshelf. And I found no mention of cribbage. 

Nothing, nada, nil. Nyet!

I asked Tom for more details. He responded with pictures of the title page and the quotation. And this led to two discoveries:

and one of Rogozhin's old gang. He's a boxing instructor now. They've all been knocking about since Rogozhin disbanded them. - (1) The actual quotation in Tom's book is "I bet my last rouble (we were playing cribbage)." ♣ (The phrases "I had twenty roubles and lost them gambling" and "to a blackguard" appear earlier.)
- (2) We were accessing different translations: Tom was reading a 2001 translation, and I was looking at a 1971 translation.

Despite this, why did one translation say "cribbage" and one omit it entirely? So I checked the longtime standard, the translation by Constance Garnett first pub-

lished in 1913, and it reads: "we were playing palki."

Wait, what?! Now we have three translations? I couldn't let this slide, and the result was a deep dive into the world of Russian translation. As it turns out, there have been at least thirteen translations of *The Idiot* into English. With the help of my friendly local librarian (thank you, Katie!), I ordered all thirteen English translations via interlibrary loan and also contacted translators Richard Pevear and Larissa Volokhonsky via email. And here's how these books translate палки, the Russian word in question:

Three of the "palki" translations, all of them published in the last two decades, include explanatory footnotes:

Ignoring the translation I couldn't lay my hands on, we see five basic approaches to translating палки in *The Idiot*.

Occurring most commonly (seven times) is the non-translation "palki." I say "non-translation" because this is simply a transliteration of the Russian word—something translators do when the meaning of the original term is confusing or unknown. Transliteration is the easy way out, like punting on fourth down.

Another easy-out is to simply ignore the difficulty and omit it from the translation altogether; one edition—the one on my shelf—takes this approach.

Yet another version gives the literal translation of the word палки ("sticks"), but nothing in the context tells us what "sticks" is, so this isn't terribly helpful.

Three translations attempt to give the reader more knowledge than we find in the

bland "palki" or the literal "sticks." One generically reads "cards," and two interpret the word more specifically as "cribbage." Using what is known as "dynamic equivalence," this translation technique aims to convey the meaning of a text rather than being wordfor-word. In other words, since the literal "sticks" and the transliteration "palki" don't tell the English reader anything, a dynamic-equivalence translation makes an educated guess that "cards" or "cribbage" will give a better sense of the passage.

This does not mean, however, that Dostoyevsky's protagonist knew how to play cribbage. Lebedev's rowdy nephew was no doubt familiar with various Russian gambling games—or maybe not so familiar, since he regularly loses money gambling!—but we have no indication that Russians knew/know how play a game invented in the English-speaking world and that traveled the globe on English-speaking naval ships.

I'd like to think that cribbage is alive and well in the world's largest country, but there is no Russian Cribbage Congress organizing clubs and tournament for 145 million Russian citizens. Until such a time, we'll have to be content with an obscure potential mention of our 400-year-old game by one of the world's greatest novelists.





#### Scott's Peek at the Past

In 1984, Robert "Mick" Michaelis (WI) was the national Master Rating Points champion with a total of 1461.43 points. 43-hundredths of a point, what?? This column will discuss what components made up the early MRP system, which lasted until the 1984–85 season.

The founding fathers of the American Cribbage Congress met in Cincinnati in January 1980 with well over a dozen items on their agenda. One key issue was to develop a player rating system. A committee chaired by **Jim Arblaster** (FL) met and developed a system for tournaments, which was approved by the ACC Board of Directors at their annual meeting in Raleigh on July 25, 1980. This MRP system was implemented in September 1980.

The first system gave points to one of every eight players in the main tourney and only included where a player finished in the playoffs. No points were given for the qualifying round. Consolation participants were given only half the points of a main in columns A–E (explained below).

In the early years there was no requirement on how many players qualified for the playoffs. Most tourneys just qualified whatever was closest to an even bracket of 8, 16, 32, or 64 players. There were typically no byes given, and the playoffs usually included matches for each spot. For instance, in the first Minnesota Open I directed, we had 230 players. We qualified 64 players, and played off for the top 16 spots . . . lots of cribbage.

I will use the first sanctioned tourney I directed, the Kalamazoo Cribbage Classic in the 1981–82 season, as an example of how points were distributed. We had 44 players (8 qualifiers) who braved a huge Michigan snowstorm to compete. My longtime friend **Jeff Shimp** (then of Allegan MI) won his last three games of qualifying and defeated all three opponents 3-0 in the playoffs to win the title and a whopping \$150 (the entry fee was \$16)!

Now for the MRPs. The early tournament sanction form had five columns, A through E. In column A, Jeff was awarded 44 points and each successive player got eight points less. For example, Jim Fabian (IL) took fifth place and got 12 points in column A.

Column B awarded one-quarter point for each year of the tournament, so in this case Jeff got .25 points. Column C reflected one-quarter point for each state represented in the tourney; three states were at the Kalamazoo Classic so each person in the top six got .75 points. Column D added points for player benefits such as prize money, trophies, food and beverage, and so on; this was divided by the number of players and then took one-tenth of that number. In this example, Jeff got 1.49 points. Finally, in column E, *every* participant in the main tournament received 10 points for playing. Jeff therefore got 44 + .25 + .75 + 1.49 + 10 = 56.49 MRPs. By the way, I won the 22-player consolation (4 qualifiers) and received 21.13 points, woohoo!

This system was somewhat confusing, but as you can see the overall goal of the Board

## Legacy Tournaments by Keith Widener

On the recommendation of a special committee led by Bob Joslin and Jason Matheny, the Board of Directors recently voted to award bonus Master Rating Points (MRPs) at the ACC's three legacy tournaments: JPW/ACC Open, Grand National, and National Open.

The JPW/ACC Open, which is the largest ACC tournament, is currently held in Reno NV in March each year. The Grand National is a rotating tournament that cycles between the three regions each fall. And the National Open—the ACC's founding tournament—is a double-elimination tournament held in Raleigh/Durham NC every July. Each of these tournaments define the ACC and as such are designated legacy tournaments. In order to protect these tournaments and preserve the heritage of the ACC, no other sanctioned tournaments are allowed to be held anywhere when these events are scheduled, making these tournaments exclusive.

In order to encourage attendance at these special events, starting with the 2024 Grand National in Las Vegas NV, players can now earn 20% additional MRPs in both the main and consolation tournaments. This 20% increase applies to both the qualifying rounds and the playoffs. These bonus points will automatically be calculated and added to any points you earn. These extra points could be exactly what you need to help you reach a goal or the next level, or even qualify you for All Star honors.

Only these three legacy tournaments will be awarding the bonus MRPs. They do not apply to tournaments leading up to or following up these events.

Make your plans now to attend all of these events and earn your bonus MRPs! The Grand National in Las Vegas begins on 11/15/24, the JPW/ACC Open starts on 3/6/25, and the National Open weekend starts on 7/17/25.

The Master Rating Points I did make got me within 50 of the coveted Two Star award, which, as followers of this space will recall, I've been chasing for much too long.

My friend and weekend host, Rodney Rideau (Las Vegas NV), had a good run: second in the first consolation and first in the second consolation. I wonder what would have happened if there had been a third consolation. Anyway, congratulations, Rodney. Remember to keep my room ready for Grand National.

I saw in the September *Cribbage World* that our esteemed ACC president, **James Morrow**, did the exact thing that I railed against **Troy Thorson** for doing, that is, directing a tournament, being high qualifier, and winning the whole shebang. Honestly, James, not a good look for the congress president. It smacks of favoritism (but congratulations anyway).

In closing I'd like to mention the recent passing of good friend and accomplished cribbage player, Roy Cook (Oceanside CA) (1935–2024). Not only an excellent player, Roy was a peg maker extraordinaire. He was a fierce competitor and a gentleman. RIP, Roy, you will be missed.

## Ruling Points

#### **Take the Judge Test!**

Have you ever thought about becoming a judge? Did you know there are protocols that judges must follow? These protocols are listed on pages 8 and 9 of the current ACC rulebook. All current judges should be familiar with these and should be following them. Some of these protocols are as follows:

- Judges should not allow players to begin an explanation of what caused the problem . . . until two judges are present.
- Where one of the players [needing a judge call] is a judge, that player should not display or open [their] rulebook.
- At least one of the judges responding to a judge call must have a rulebook in hand.
- Judges are not allowed to judge a situation wherein they are a party to the dispute [that is, you cannot judge your own problem].
- Judges should monitor the pegging of [penalty] points to ensure there are no errors.

- A senior judge should be appointed as head judge.
- Whenever possible, . . . a judge should not judge a situation involving a family member, club member, roommate, or traveling partner [to avoid any conflict of interests].

While it is permissible for two individuals to resolve their own problems (with a few exceptions in which judges *must* be called), if you are a judge and you are involved in an issue, call for judges and recuse yourself from the decision so as to ensure fairness to the other player (you are not allowed to judge your own dispute anyway).

If you are not a judge, by knowing these protocols you can better understand what is happening when judges are called. And remember, if you do not agree with the judges' ruling or something doesn't sound right, don't be shy, call for the head judge. Make that person do some work!

Remember to be nice to your opponent, and let's all have fun!

A cribbage hand can be played by good players a multitude of ways. Let's examine a hand where I disagree with two players you may have heard of: **Erik Locke** and **Terry Cushman**.

It's the first hand of the game and you are the pone and are dealt A-A-5-5-8-8. What's your hold? Erik says A-A-5-5. This hand has many ways to get to eight points, and Erik says 8-8 doesn't usually hurt him in the crib. Terry likes 5-5-8-8 and then lead a 5 to try to garner a 31-for-4 with his 8-8. Terry is not afraid of the A-A discard, especially on first street. I come down on the side of caution; I'm keeping A-5-5-8 and trying to stifle the dealer's crib with A-8. I lead my Ace and usually avoid potential pegging landmines.

I just don't think any of these holds risk a big crib—even on the first hand of the game. There will be plenty of other situations during the game where the risk will be worth the reward.



been tossing the idea around since the Memorial Day Tournament, and was so happy to see a great turn out with such little notice and planning time.




great sense of humor and was a great competitor. He will be greatly missed by all.
