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






CURRENT SUSPENSIONS

The Ethics Committee suspended Jack B. Shumate III (Newport OR) for six months beginning June 1 and ending November 30 for "actions or conversation unbecoming a member of the ACC." There is one modification to this suspension: Jack is allowed to direct and play in Club 420 beginning September 1. He is not allowed to contact or play in other Grass Roots clubs, including their GRRTs.

The Ethics Committee suspended Roy McGillivray (Chico CA) indefinitely, starting January 11, 2024, for leaving a Grass Roots event without completing all the games; this is a repeat offense.

President's Column

Cribbage vs. Baseball Henry Chadwick, an English statistician, in 1869 is credited with changing the English

game of cricket's batting average to fit the American game of baseball: a player's at-bats versus how many times they reach first base. In baseball .300 or 30% is considered great, and .400 or 40%—that is, getting on base just four out of ten times—is considered unachievable.

Kevin Harris has been running a batting average contest for the last few years. For the ACC, this is the number of games played versus the number of games won. This year, **Erik Locke**, the six-time national champion, also won the batting average title with .603, or just over 60% (see page 9 in the September *Cribbage World*). If Erik were a baseball player with a .600 average, he would be a "Bazillionaire" with a capital B. Alas, his 2024 batting championship puts him in the "Hundredaire" club.

If you have a .500 or lower average per tournament in the ACC, you aren't going to qualify for the playoffs. Even Erik's .603 in a 22-game tournament only gives him an on-the-bubble scorecard and would send him over to sign up for the consolation in most tournaments with 26 points. (We can't figure in skunks for the batting average, only games won.) In cribbage, it takes a .636 average in a 22-game tournament to qualify in most tournaments. In other words, you have to win 14 of 22 games for a 28 card.

The ACC batting average contest included only sanctioned tournaments. After every main or consolation qualifying round you take a picture of your scorecard, good or bad, and email it to Kevin. He then tracks all the players' results for the year and sends weekly updates. You must play at least 300 games, which is only ten mains (22 games) and nine consolations (9 games), and at the end of the year you will have a picture of every scorecard for the season. We can clearly see cribbage is *way* harder than baseball.

13), scored three 28-hands in the space of seven days (page 15), loves pesto (page 27), and was a first-time tournament winner (page 22).



Tournament Reports

Good news! Tournament reports can now be submitted entirely online!


For the past year, ACC programmer **Scott Harker** has been hard at work creating an online program that will take the entire tournament reporting system digital. Starting with the sanction request, then the tournament flyer, all the way to the final tournament report—everything is now digital.

Tournament directors must now report **all** results online—main, consolation, satellites—including payouts and expenses. Tournament results will be approved after your tournament commissioner receives (a) receipts for player benefits and expenses and (b) ACC-sanctioning fees.

If you aren't computer literate, line up a codirector or club member to help you. If that doesn't work, then ask your eight-year-old granddaughter to enter the results for you.

One final note: if your tournament was approved prior to August 1 and if it has satellite events, you will need to add some additional info on the sanction request. First, log in to your tournament director account and hit the "update" button on the far left; supply the required data for the satellite events; and then follow the prompts.

The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros





I've often stated that A456 is the best pegging hand for a nondealer, but what about its value pegging as the dealer? Let's take a look.

We have a "magic 11"—the best magic 11: 5-6. With the 4-5-6 combo we could amass a pegging bonanza. And we have an Ace for good measure.

If the pone leads a picture how should we play it? It looks easy: we have a 5 for 15-2 and a 6 for a possible 31-2 on another picture play. If the pone matches our 5, we can potentially get a three card run *and* a 31. What a goldmine, correct?

Let's examine another way this hand can be pegged. Let's play an Ace on the opening picture lead. It's likely the response will be a 5 to make the count 16. Then we have a 4, 5, or 6 to play. Obviously matching the 5 does nothing for us and could be disastrous in some cases. But playing the 6 to make the count 22 can put the pone in a predicament: if he has another 5 we get 31-for-5 plus a probable 15-for-3 on the next series. If 22 is a go we play our 4 for a three-card run and then our 5 for 31-for-5.

Just a little thought the next time this pegging situation arises. I have only one request though: please do not yell at me when an opponent plays a 7 on your 6! It's going to happen a very small percentage of the time but not enough to curtail me from my pegging plans.

Scott's Peek at the Past

In November, the American Cribbage Congress will hold its 43rd annual awards presentation in Las Vegas. The first awards ceremony took place on September 18, 1982, in Milwaukee, and it was a terrific event! **Dan Weir** was the host and tournament chairman, and awards were given for the All American Team, Hall of Fame, President's Award, recruiting honors, and Mr. and Mrs. Cribbage World. This month, I will discuss a few awards that are no longer in existence.

The first notable ACC award was Mr. and Mrs. Cribbage World. Three front page stories about this honor appeared during the first five issues of Cribbage World. Ten couples were nominated in 1980, and all ACC members could vote on this award. Frank and Pat O'Connor (MA) easily won the first M&MCW title. They were outstanding players and very instrumental in the junior cribbage program. Nine other couples won this prestigious honor in subsequent years:

There was a Ladies All American Team the first few years of the ACC, with the Top Ten female MRP earners receiving awards. Mary Cornwell and Dottie Schwedrsky were the top-ranked ladies the first two years. After 1983, a number of women spoke against this designation, and the Ladies All American Team was quickly discontinued.

In the early days of the ACC, if a person recruited a new member, that was noted on their membership entry. **Guy Pence** (Northfield MN) was an outstanding recruiter of cribbage players, and in 1982 the recruiting honor was named after him. **Frank O'Connor** (MA) won the first **Guy Pence Recruiting Award** for 1980, followed by . . .

This award was eliminated in 1990.

Another early honor was noteworthy but given only once. The Century Club was given to any city with at least one hundred ACC members. In July 1982, Racine (WI) hit the century mark. Racine was the home of the Vic Christofferson Tournament

since the late 1960s, and Dick Kurz was a key recruiter in that process. Lincoln NE, Milwaukee WI, and St. Paul MN were cities that had at least seventy ACC members at that time. By the summer of 1982, the ACC also achieved the goal of at least one member in every state!

In the first few years, *Cribbage World* also recognized **All State Teams** and listed the top five players for MRPs in many states.

For a couple years, the ACC awarded the All Americans not only a plaque but also a nice patch. Pictured nearby is a patch that I received in 1982.

Scott knows so much ACC history because he has lived through most of it—and has done just about everything in the ACC: BOD member, VP, president, national MRP champ x2, All American x7, tournament director, and youngest person elected to the ACC's Hall of Fame.

Three Hot Players!

Jim Mahan (Appleton WI) won three mains in a row: Yee Peg for the Hangover (Aug. 18), Portland Summer Festival of Cribbage (Sept. 1), and Taking the Longview Midweek (Sept. 8)!

Brian Napiwocki (Plover WI) held three big hands: a 29 and a 28 at Stetsonville on July 12 in back-to-back games and then a 28-hand at Club 120 on September 19 (but he won only one game that night).

Patrick Sullivan (Clancy MT) started playing with Club 25 (Helena MT) last season. He won the Helena Spring Roundup main on May 31 and the Deer Lodge consy on September 4, where he had two 28-hands. Then, at the first night of club on September 10, Patrick had another 28-hand!



Tyler won the 44-player Jim Jones/LeeAnn Ka'ai Memorial played at Laguna Woods CA. Tyler qualified third with a 20/9 card (twelve games) and in the playoffs took down Ryan Denissen (La Mesa), Cy Madrone (Santa Barbara), and Bob Prochnow (San Diego). All three matches went five games, so it was a grueling day for Ty. It is especially fitting that he should win a



tournament named, in part, after the late **Jim Jones** who, sadly, passed away at age 90 a few months ago. The May 2023 *Cribbage World* included an article on Tyler and Jim—the two oldest players in Surf City 29ers Club 164—and discussed their ability to compete and win at their advanced ages.

Tyler lives with his son Clark in Fountain Valley and still drives to club, although he stays off the freeways. He walks every day and has stated that he hopes to ski on his 100th birthday; there may not be any snow in Southern California in early October but you get the idea: his goal is to say active.

At club the Tuesday after his big win, Tyler gifted all players with a crisp \$5 bill to show his appreciation for the members helping him and being patient. Thanks, Tyler, and keep up the good work.

It is believed that the former oldest tournament winner was the late **Paul Yellon** (Laguna Woods) who, at age 90+, beat Yours Truly in the Orange Crush Classic consolation in Anaheim CA on June 11, 2016.

Speaking of that Orange Crush Classic, in the main a truly odd thing happened. In the final qualifying game **Bryan Gurden** (Las Vegas) played **Artland Ka'ai** (Costa Mesa); each went into the game with 15 game points. There would be seven qualifiers, and there were already six players who had completed qualifying with 16 game points. That meant that the winner of Bryan and Artland's game would be high qualifier with 17 points and the loser would not qualify with 15. For the record, Bryan won and went on to win the tournament, while Artland played in the consolation, where his bad luck continued.

Ruling Points by Keith Widener

Citii Wideliei

"Don't touch my pegs!"

Have you ever heard anyone say: "Don't touch my pegs else it's a two-point penalty"? Is it true? What happens if you accidently touch your opponent's pegs? And what if you pick up your own front peg? Then what?

Rule 8.5 covers improperly removing pegs. Several scenarios are covered, but basically, if you pick up your front peg then your back peg becomes your front peg and you peg your score from the peg still in the board—meaning that you lose the last score that you pegged. If you peg backward, the pegs stay where they are. If you pick up the front peg and peg your score from the hole where it came from, then you must move the peg behind the back peg, but you are then allowed to peg your score from there without penaltyeven if you had placed the peg in the game hole. It is not a false claim of game, because the infraction that occurred first was the removal of the front peg. If both pegs are removed (or jarred loose), the players shall determine where the front peg belongs and then the score can be pegged without penalty. Call for judges if needed.

Rule 8.6 covers etiquette in touching

pegs: After notifying the opponent, a player may adjust (tighten) his or her own loose peg or correct an overpegged score. There is no penalty for accidentally touching an opponent's peg (no harm, no foul). Remember to make sure that your opponent knows what you are doing.

Rule 8.7 covers pegging with the opponent's pegs: If a player picks up an opponent's peg to record a score..., the peg shall be returned to its former place. The nonoffender receives two penalty points. Accidently touching your opponent's pegs is not an issue, but actually picking them up results in a two-point penalty.

Rule 8.8 covers what to do if you record your score in the wrong track: If a player records an otherwise correct score but places the peg in the wrong track on his or her side of the board or in opponent's track, it shall be moved to the proper track without penalty. This is just a mechanical mistake that is fixable and doesn't warrant any penalties.

Play nice, be fair, and have fun. That is what the ACC is all about.

Here's how to score only three points yet have all five cards contribute to the score. You must hold a Jack that matches the upturned card, and the upturned card contributes only this one point. The other three cards must make 15-2, giving a total of three points. Only four hands produce this result; here's the logic.

Ignoring suit, twenty-one hands make 15-2 using three cards. You can't use a combo that has a 5, because it will then create an additional 15-2 with the Jack (these hands are marked red in the list below). For the same reason, you can't use A-4 (green) or 2-3 (blue). Finally, you can't use a 15-2 that also has a pair in it, because they are then worth four points (purple).

Eliminating these hands leaves only four hands that match these criteria (they are indented in the list below). The upturned card has to match the suit of the Jack in your hand, but it cannot, for the reasons explained in the previous paragraph, add any point other than nobs.


