# President's Column

**5,000 & 20%** The Board of Directors has been looking at ways to boost attendance at the ACC's three legacy tournaments. Legacy tournaments are the three large events sponsored by the ACC each year.

**Grand National** moves around the country each year so that local players have a chance to play a large tournament without having to fly clear across the country. They are frequently held in picturesque or historic locations; the next three GNs will be played in Deadwood SD (2025), Niagara Falls NY (2026), and Spokane WA (2027). The **ACC Open/Tournament of Champions** is held at the J Resort in Reno NV every March. And the **National Open** is held in Durham NC (formerly Raleigh) in July.

To boost attendance, the BOD recently voted to award 20% more MRPs for players who qualify in the sanctioned events (main and consy) at all legacy tourneys.

If that isn't enough of a reason to hit the Tournament Trail—to say nothing of having a great time at these tournaments—here are 5,000 more reasons. The BOD also voted to give each of these tournaments a \$5,000 grant to cover expenses. With expenses being covered by these grants, the prize money will see a significant boost.

What makes you want (or not want) to attend these legacy tournaments: location, cost of travel, cost of guest rooms, something else? When you see a BOD member, give them your thoughts.

Speaking of the Board of Directors: we are holding a BOD election this year, so now is the time to get your bio written up so you can run for the board.

If you don't want to run for the BOD, you will have a chance to elect the members of the next BOD. Full voting instructions will be printed in the May *Cribbage World*, but for now, remember that you can vote online or via mail. We encourage all members to vote and have a say in your representation.





# The Inside Track by Rob Medeiros •••••• •••••• •••••• ••••••

One of the earmarks of a successful pegger is the feeling of uncomfortableness they imbue in their opponents. The successful player will mix up his leads from pairs and nonpairs, lead high from some hands like 3-4-5-8 and 2-3-4-9, and occasionally lead a 5 from a double 5 (I don't recommend making that play a habit though). We want to keep our opponents guessing and not let them get into a rhythm or get a read on our style of play.

The play that I find works the most is leading from the nonpair, such as 2-2-3. If you lead the 3 and score a 15 with the 2, dealer will often relax, thinking you led from a pair of 3s not 2s, and match your 2 with a degree of certainty. You then take 6 points for a trip and often hear some frustrated muttering!

Remember this concept: always be the player forcing the tough decisions—not the player forced to make the tough decisions.

# Scott's Peek at the Past

Since the American Cribbage Congress was established in 1979 with a two-dollar annual membership fee, the longest span of time without a dues increase was from 1995 to 2007. In September 2007 at the Board Of Directors meeting in Portland ME, it was reported that the ACC coffers were down over \$60,000 in the past seven years. Along with increased printing costs, the price of a first class stamp had risen from 32¢ to 41¢ since the last ACC dues increase. (Fun fact: 2007 was also the year the Forever Stamp was introduced by the Postal Service.) The BOD increased membership fees as follows: individual dues went up five bucks to \$15 with an added partner now \$3 more; life membership rose from \$80 to \$120 and the life member spouse was an extra \$60, with the life membership eligible age going from 60 to 62 years old; junior dues stayed at \$3 per year.

At the September 2015 Board meeting in Yankton SD, the directors voted to increase individual dues by five dollars again up to \$20 and joint membership would be \$25. The life member category was discontinued with the start of the 2016 calendar year, although it was brought back at a later date at the current price of \$300 for anyone 65 and over. At the start of 2016, a first class stamp was 49¢ and, of course, now it's 73¢!

But with all this inflation news impacting just about every item of everyday life, and six membership increases in the ACC since 1979, how about this? The cost of the first ACC rulebook in 1981 was \$2, and the price of an ACC rulebook in 2025 is still just \$2!

Here are the first three official rulebooks,  $\clubsuit$  each of which was priced at \$2. The 1981 gold rulebook and the 1984 white rulebook were each 5½ x 8½ in size, while the 1989 white rulebook was 4 x 8—and much easier to carry around or put in your pocket.





Ruling Points by Keith Widener

### **BACKWARD** gnigge9

From our email archives comes a question from Joyce Keay of East Falmouth MA. She wants to know what happens when a player pegs backward. After we tell them they pegged backward, do they get to correct it?

Rule 8.5a(2) states: If the player completes recording the score in the wrong direction and releases the peg, both pegs shall remain where they are and that score and the previous score are forfeited. Even though the ACC Code of Ethics states that allowing an opponent to continue pegging backward after the initial occurrence(s) is an unacceptable practice and grounds for suspension, that does not mean that when you tell them about pegging backward that they get to correct the error. The pegs stay where they are. And the reason there is a potential "s" on the word "occurrence," they may peg backward more than once very quickly before you can get any words out of your mouth, or they may continue to peg backward even after you keep warning them. The key here is that you are trying to play a fair and honest game by warning them. Hopefully they will correct their pegging.

So why do we need to warn our opponents about this anyway? Well believe it or not, there have been some unscrupulous players that have allowed their opponent to peg all the way around backward then claim a victory by a huge margin—in essence a triple skunk. This is not playing the game properly and not the way we want things being done in the ACC, so we had to put it in writing in the ACC Code of Ethics.

Remember folks: be kind to your opponents—and always have fun.

# Vicki's Cribbage Vibes Stories about Cribbage on the Eastern Seaboard

April Showers bring May flowers? Maine usually has a leftover snowstorm in April, but the good news is, it does not last long. April Fools is always a great day, and this year Easter is in April. #### dateline: April 1

Sometimes Maria and I travel to visit family. Other times our travel is for cribbage tournaments. And every now and then we travel for a wedding.

Two of our dear friends, Rose and Jimmy, invited us to their wedding in Lake Como, Italy. Rose and Jimmy live in Beverly Hills CA, since Rose has worked as a model and actress there for years. Lake Como is known as a destination wedding location because of its amazing natural beauty and historic villas. Many of the villas are owned by the richest people in the world, some of whom are Hollywood superstars.

Maria and I had never been to Lake Como, so we were excited to have a reason to visit. The wedding venue was a 300-year-old villa overlooking the lake. Incredibly beautiful mountains, waterfalls, and picturesque towns added to the view.

When it came time for the wedding to start, Maria and I were seated in the back row. Just before the ceremony began, a gentleman sat down next to us. It was George Clooney! He lives just a few villas down the lake. We had some small talk during the ceremony, nothing too serious since his wife Amal was traveling for business. I asked him if he plays cribbage. *He said yes!* He used to play between shoots during his first "real" job, when he played a doctor on the TV show ER.

Being the cribbage nerd that I am, I told him I had my travel board with me. Being the adult, George said we shouldn't play during our friend's wedding or reception. Reluctantly I agreed. However, he offered to play at his house. The next day, many of us from the wedding party took a private boat over to his villa. **↓** An amazing thing happened, George knew how to play. Maria was too mesmerized to play him, so the second-string player from our family took him on.

Here is where the story takes a turn. For us to visit George's house, we had to sign an NDA (nondisclosure agreement). We are not allowed to talk about anything that happened inside his house. We were not allowed to take photos either. We can only tell you that an even more amazing thing happened on this trip: I managed to win two of three games from Maria!



A couple weeks ago at club after losing my first game, I won eight in a row with two skunks. Meanwhile, Lorraine Ghazarian was working on a grand slam. In her ninth game against Tony DePinto, she was dealing from more than 20 out while Tony needed 10. He made only 8, while Lorraine cut into a 24-hand, won the game, and turned in a richly deserved grand slam. She won the night with 18/9, beating my 18/8. Later I got to thinking: "Wow, that was a bad beat; I had an 18 card and she caught a 24 on fourth street to beat me." "Bad Beat" is a poker term used to identify great hands that are beaten; for example, four of a kind that is beaten by a straight flush. Most cardrooms have a Bad Beat pot, and every couple weeks the player with the highest Bad Beat hand wins the pot. ESPN has a Bad Beats show that features clips of games where, for example, a last second play either beats the point spread or makes/misses the over/under. A Bad Beat is a situation where, seemingly, defeat is snatched from the jaws of victory (to misquote the late Jim McKay).

We should establish something similar in cribbage. Let me give a few examples of Bad Beats I've experienced. I wrote previously about dealing from 26 out with the pone needing 4 holes; I won and I'm sure my opponent would call that a Bad Beat. My personal all time Bad Beat happened a few years ago. I was counting first from 12 holes out and was dealt A-2-2-3-5-5. My opponent was about 35 out. In that position, I decided to try for the skunk because I had so many out cards (only two cards, 5 or 6, would not improve my hand). I tossed the pair of nickels and, sure enough, a 5 was cut. I did not get out. My opponent held 4-4-6-7 so the cut gave him a 16-hand and a 20-crib with his 10-K toss. Upshot? Instead of marking my card with a 3, I had to put down a big L. That, my friends, was a Bad Beat.

I've also written about a high roller event at Roadrunner Classic in Phoenix. Another player and I went into the final game with 12/6 while the late **DeLynn Colvert** had 12/5. The other player and I won our final games to turn in 14/7. DeLynn was dealing from less than 10 out while his opponent was about 50 out. If DeLynn gets the skunk he has 15/6 and takes first. Not so fast. His opponent holds 4-4-6-6 and, you guessed it, cuts the nickel, thereby getting over the skunk line. DeLynn won the game but had only 14/6. Only the first two places paid, leaving DeLynn on the outside looking in. Bad Beat? You betcha, Red Ryder. DeLynn, who, shall we say, was rather prudent with a buck, took that loss to his grave.

All cribbage players have similar stories. If you send me yours I'll include it in a future column. If we get enough good ones we'll start a Bad Beats Hall of Fame.

A postscript to last month's column where I described finally earning my second star. Fifteen years ago when I received the first star I was #60. After making the second star I was #59, so in fifteen years and 5,000 points I gained one position on the All Time MRP list. That will be short lived though, as **Terry Weber** will pass me soon.

These two boards have a special place in my office.

If you don't see it, go to SAVED GAMES TAB." Once we notice this has happened (in a very crowded lobby!), we have to delete the new game that you started, as it is

not official. You may think that starting a new game is how to quickly solve an issue, but it actually causes problems. The stuck player needs to leave and go to the lobby and try to go back into the same game. If not, go out of the lounge and try that. *The other player should stay put and wait at the saved game table.* Listen to what your TD is telling you to do or not do. Also, bear in mind that if you won the deal, a new game has a 50% chance of you losing that edge. So please, always return to the saved game—it is auto-saved when one player has clicked their cards. Thanks!

*Editor's note:* Rex earned his Gold Award shortly before passing away in late 2024, so this is a combo obituary/Gold Award story.

Rex Paddock passed away on December 30. Born in 1933 in Terry MT, he enlisted in the United State Air Force after graduating high school. 
