Tasks like setting up the playing area; scheduling weekly, regional, and national tournaments; entering scores each week.


Does your director make you want to show up early every week?

#### Rules

I am writing in response to Keith Widener's "Ruling Points" article on page 17 in the February 2025 *Cribbage World*. His premise that "if they miss a couple points and you win because of it, you really didn't win . . . you didn't deserve it" is objectively and patently untrue. Grass Roots rules require you to count your own points. I've lost multiple games by missing points; in each instance, my opponent fairly and deservedly (according to the rulebook) won the game. Unless cribbage rules move closer to poker rules where "the cards speak," and you don't have to declare your hand or how many points you have (which I am firmly in favor of), then Keith's premise is completely false and sets a poor example. Furthermore, he spends the first few paragraphs speaking to the rules of the game; then says if one plays by the rules, they didn't deserve to win. Which is it? Do we get to pick and choose when the rules apply? Do we get to pick which rules apply? Rule 9.5 says that "no aid from an individual . . . may be used to assist . . . while pegging or counting the hands or crib." That seems pretty clear to me. *Michael Santosuosso (Abington MA)* 

Cribbage World asked Keith Widener to respond to this letter; here is what he wrote:

The February column was about an individual's choice to help their opponent in counting their points due to issues with aging versus rule 9.5. Grass Roots rules do not say that you cannot assist your opponent if you so desire. Rule 9.5 was not written to deter someone from being nice to their opponent. As the commissioner of judges in this organization, I will not enforce rule 9.5 against two people playing the game and choosing to help each other and neither of them calling for a judge. (Remember, there are only a few instances in the rulebook that require you to call for a judge.) So if you choose to not help your opponent and they miss some points, that is fine and your choice. But I stand by my assertion that if you go on to win that game, which you would have otherwise lost had they properly counted their points, then you didn't really deserve it, because in reality they had enough points to beat you. I also stand by the last thing I said: stay out of other people's games and mind your own business.

At the upcoming Grand National in Deadwood SD in October, the BOD will award the Central Region's next Grand National, scheduled for 2028. ACC members interested in hosting this event must inform Executive VP Rick Shea (31for14@gmail.com) of their interest by August 31. Detailed information is not necessary at this time; a general plan is sufficient to consider the bid.

Play **smart**, play **fair**, play **fast**—but mostly play **nice** 

Anyone who reads *Cribbage World* on a regular basis knows that I firmly believe the heart-and-soul of the American Cribbage Congress is not the cadre of touring professionals who travel all over the country playing weekend tournaments. Rather, the ACC prospers when Grass Roots clubs are thriving. And clubs thrive when they are populated by players who love cribbage for the game itself—not just to win prizes and awards.


I am very sorry to report the death of a longtime member of my home club. At ninety-three years old, **Robert Stritzinger** → was the oldest member of Beer City Peggers Club 71 in Grand Rapids MI.

Bob joined the ACC in 2008 and on average played 22 weeks each season. That term, "average," is a good description of Bob as a cribbage player. Over the course of 376 weekly events and seventeen seasons, he played 3,378 games and won 51.95% of them (1,755 wins and 1,623 losses). His number of wins per week shows an almost perfect bell curve. ↓ He never had a grand slam (best score: 19/8 +154), but he never had a string of pearls either (worst score: 2/1 -128)



Bob earned points in 130 of his 376 weeks (34.6%) and in 5 of the 20 GRRTs/GRNTs he played (25%).

He earned his Bronze Award on January 10, 2017, which was the 203rd week he played, and by the end he had earned 1,898 GRPs.



Bob put scoring bookends on his cribbage career: the first time he showed at club, he scored 16/7 +121 and took first place (of 17 players). The last time he played Grass Roots, he scored 14/6 +70 and took fifth place (of 31 players).

talking about an average player? Because the ACC is populated by average players, and Bob is a prime example. He came to club because he loved the game—not to win fame and fortune with his cribbage prowess.

Even though Bob may have been an average cribbage player, he was far above average in other areas of life. Born in 1930, he earned degrees from Michigan State University and the University of Pennsylvania. He proudly served his country in the Korean War as a U.S. Marine.

Bob married Olga, the love of his life, in 1958. During their sixty-seven years together, they raised seven children and welcomed twenty-four grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren into the family.

Professionally, Bob followed his passion for helping others as a personal financial planner and didn't retire until he was ninety years old! A devout Roman Catholic, he practiced his faith daily and lived out its teachings through service. For over twenty years he delivered Meals on Wheels, mentored young people through Junior Achievement, and contributed to the blood bank.

In addition to cribbage, he enjoyed tennis, softball, and golf and competed in the Senior Olympics well into his 80s.

A few words on a page don't really do justice to Bob's life, but they do remind me that the ACC is filled with average players who are far above average in life.

Our club honors deceased members by putting their names on our cribbage boards. I had the privilege of playing on "Bob's board" this week, ♥ and it reminded me once again of a life well lived.

> Club 419 (Laguna Hills CA)—on January 22, two players had 28-hands within minutes of each other: Artland Ka'ai and Roger Aielli.





Last weekend I suffered one of the craziest losses in my cribbage career. It was against the elite player **Jerry Hardy** in the finals of a tournament. It was the third game and I was already down 2-0, so my prospects weren't looking great. But this one hurt.

I was dealing from fourteen out, and Jerry needed ten with first count. I opened my hand to see the scintillating 3-4-6-8-10-Q. I dutifully discarded 10-Q and hoped for a decent cut and good defense to hold Jerry. The cut was a King, and Jerry led a 7.

Even though I have a horrendous hand, I can't afford to make 15-2 with my 8, so I play my 4. Jerry counters with a 5. Now I'm in dire straits: Jerry must have a 6 right? So if he does, what can I play to lessen the damage? The answer is my 6. I'll get the four-card run, Jerry will match my card, and I'll get the 31 with my 3.

To my surprise Jerry said go after I played my 6 for 22, so I played my 8 for five and a go for six. Jerry got last card, and had 5-7-10-J, with the right King for seven points.

Jerry is now two out, and I'm four out after my fortuitous ten points pegging. take my two-point hand and get ready to turn over my crib, but before I do I think to myself: "I threw 10-Q, Jerry has 5-10-J in his hand; there is literally no way I can have a point in here." Alas, I was correct.



Jerry matched my 2 on the first play of the next hand and won the game and the match. Needless to say, I was talking to myself on my four-hour ride home.

# Scott's Peek at the Past

When the founders of the American Cribbage Congress met on January 11, 1980, in Cincinnati OH, they established a number of committees and made major decisions. Number 6 on their list was to set the annual dues at \$2 per member. This column will discuss changes to the membership fees over the first two decades of the ACC.

The congress mailed out the initial eight-page *Cribbage World* magazine in March 1980 through a bulk rate postage permit from Kissimmee FL by ACC Secretary-Treasurer **Jim Arblaster**. This rate was approximately 10¢ per issue, compared with a first class stamp, which cost 15¢ in 1980. I will compare the ACC dues increases with the first class stamp cost as we proceed.

In the summer of 1981, ACC President **Joseph Wergin** stated that dues must increase in the next year to cover increased printing and mailing costs. In 1982, the board of directors voted to raise individual adult dues to \$3 and added a married couple category for \$5 a year. A junior membership under 18 years old was \$1, and a life member division over sixty years old was added for \$25.

In 1982, a first class stamp was 18¢ and two years later rose to 20¢. So in 1984, the BOD passed an increase to \$5 for an individual, \$7 for a married couple, \$2 for junior dues, and \$40 for a life member (a life member spouse was added for two bucks more).

Effective in 1988, a stamp price went up to 25¢, and the BOD increased adult dues to \$7, a married couple to \$10, with a junior membership at \$3. The life member for 60+ years was upped to \$60, and a life member spouse was \$25 more.

**Glory Be! A Price Reduction!** That was a headline on page 7 of the September 1991 *Cribbage World*. Individual dues remained at \$7, but the board voted to reduce the married couple rate from \$10 to \$8. Yahoo!

The fee schedule remained constant for the next four years, but inflation caused a significant dues increase in the summer of 1995. Higher mailing costs necessitated a move to second class mail as the price of a first class stamp was now 32¢. Individual dues went up to \$10, while a couple rose to \$12. A life member over 60 years old jumped to \$80 annually, and a life member spouse was an additional \$40.

In next month's column, I will discuss the ACC dues increases in 2007 and 2015, and also something that inflation has *not* touched in the past forty-five years!

Scott knows ACC history because he has lived through most of it—and has done just about everything in the ACC: BOD member, VP, president, national MRP champ x2, All American x7, tournament director, and youngest person elected to the ACC's Hall of Fame.

# Redeal? Yep, redeal.

A couple of weeks ago I received an email from one of my Midwestern cribbage friends, and he had encountered an issue in his club with regard to rule 4.4.d.(9). This rule relates to the table of actions on pages 24–25 of the rulebook, and it states: **Play stops at time of discovery**, and all points pegged during the play are retracted. Both hands and the crib are dead, and the same player redeals. Rule 4.4.d.(1) (The same dealer redeals) is the same, except it is before the starter card is turned. These actions are invoked when too many cards have been dealt (that is, more than twelve).

The issue was that many players and judges think this redeal is unfair to the player who does not have extra cards in their hand. Their argument is that if the dealer has too many cards then the dealer should be penalized and the pone should be allowed to keep their hand.

When the Rules Committee was looking at the issue of too many cards they had to take into account that we frequently use decks that are old and/or have been used by casinos, and those decks may have shaved edges or holes in them. In fact, especially in Grass Roots, we don't use new cards very often. So the committee did not want to penalize players based on the fact that there is an increased likelihood of cards sticking together.

Even after I explained the logic for the rule, I was still pressed on how unfair it was to the player who had the correct number of cards and basically did nothing wrong. Everyone who thinks this way especially judges—need to pay attention. Redealing because too many cards were dealt is **not** unfair to anybody, because if the cards had been properly dealt, the distribution of the cards would be different, and thus the hands dealt would have been different. Why? Because if there is an extra card, you have no idea where in the mix the extra card was.

To prove this, deal out twelve cards in sequence: A, 2, 3, 4, and so on. One hand will be A-3-5-7-9-J, and the other will be 2-4-6-8-10-Q. Keeping the same order, now stick a King in the middle somewhere. In this example, let's put it after the 3 and redeal. Now one hand will be A-3-4-6-8-10, and the other will be 2-K-5-7-9-J. This gives you totally different hands. The only way the hands would be the same is if the extra card was the very last card dealt—but we don't know that, do we? Case closed.

Please be nice, and let's all have fun.



This year is the biannual election for the ACC's Board of Directors. BOD members are elected for a two-year term beginning September 1, 2025, and ending August 31, 2027. The BOD meets twice year-ly—once online and once in person—to handle the administrative and financial business of the organization.

Any current ACC member in good standing at least eighteen years of age can submit the paperwork to run for the board. (If you think another member should run for the BOD, please contact them directly and encourage them to file the paperwork.)

Candidates must submit an email containing a statement that they wish to run for the BOD, how to print their name on the ballot, ACC number, address, phone number, and a biography (200 words max). Letters and biographies must be sent via email by April 1 to the chair of the nominating committee, Megan Player, at megan@monkeyplayground.net.

In addition, all candidates must submit a high-resolution digital picture for publication in *Cribbage World* by sending it via email to **cwed152@gmail.com** (do *not* send photos to Megan). Photos (head shot only) should be in sharp focus with no distractions in the background.

Biographies and the ballot will be printed in the May *Cribbage World*. Eligible voters must be at least eighteen years old, have current membership when the ballot is mailed, and have a valid mailing address. Joint members who normally get only one CW will get two in May. And members who normally read *Cribbage World* online will receive a paper copy in May.



Jen, June, and Peg. While **Bob Milk** was directing the tourney, I interviewed him about the history of online tournaments. Bob was the first internet commissioner (ten years), followed by **Tammy Gibbons** (six years) and me (four years). Here's what Bob said:

A bunch of us were playing on the old Microsoft Zone.

Being on the ACC Board of Directors, I brought the idea to the board twice before they said yes. Paul Barnes was actually the first head of the effort, but stepped down after a couple of months. I volunteered to take it over. We worked with Zone staff to have our own private room for games.

We started in August 2004. It was well received by many. At the board meeting in February 2005, we presented the IRP system and were given the green light as well as a small budget for trophies. Other than that, there were no other expenses for the



program. The initial reaction from the board was split, but mostly negative. The board approved a trial, which was successful.

The Zone loved the idea, as it brought more gamers to their site. In 2006, the Zone shut down. Next was Game Colony, where I negotiated a no-cost contract that required a link to Game Colony

Castles, palaces, and "happily ever after" fairy tales. While recovering from Oktoberfest, Maria and I visited some Bavarian castles and palaces. Kings, queens, jacks, and probably a few jokers, walked the halls of these royal estates. During our European travels, we have seen evidence of cribbage being played in English and French royal palaces. While we didn't find any evidence of cribbage in these Bavarian castles, it was highly probable it was there. 


